As of October, “Ok Boomer” has become the slogan of an entire generation. A New York Times columnist recently wrote, “‘Ok boomer’ has become Generation Z’s endlessly repeated retort to the problem of older people who just don’t get it, a rallying cry for millions of fed up kids. Teenagers use it to reply to... basically any person over 30 who says something condescending about young people — and the issues that matter to them.” Would you consider Gen Z’s increasing dismissal of older generations justified?

Generational division is not unique to 2019. In fact, the divided kingdom Israel in 928 B.C. was the result of generational disdain! God’s kingdom was fractured when young king Rehoboam abandoned the wisdom of old men and followed the counsel of his young peers (1 Kings 12). Because Rehoboam dismissed the aged generation, Judah and Israel would war with one another for centuries until each was conquered by foreign empires.

There’s no way around it; old people (generally) know better than young people (see Deuteronomy 32:7; Job 12:20, 32:7). Scripture clearly attests to the insight of the elderly and calls God’s people to “flee youthful passions.” (2 Timothy 2:22)

Unfortunately, generational disdain is a two-way street. A.D. 63 saw aged members of the Ephesian church “despise”

young leader Timothy (1 Timothy 4:12). Because he was different, Timothy was pinned for division perpetuated by older members of the church! How should a young Christian respond when he is condescended by an older Christian for his youth? Paul urged Timothy to respond, not by dismissal, but by his Godly example.

The church is to be a sanctuary for refugees of the generational war. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 12:13, “For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body— Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.” In Christ, the walls of race and socioeconomic status are torn down. Are not the walls of generational division torn down as well? Only in Christ may perfect unity be found.

Recently I heard minister Lonnie Jones preach, “If a demographic is my definition, I’ve lost connection with Christ.” The church is defined by God as those unified in Christ. Let us not focus on our differences; let us see one another first as brothers and sisters in Christ; and let us thank our King for citizenship in a kingdom that cannot be divided.
