# The story that is changing how we see the world....

Two summers ago I attended a retreat at the River's Edge, the retreat and wellness center operated by the Sister of St. Joseph in Cleveland. The retreat was facilitated by Clevelander Judy Cannato, whose book, *Radical Amazement*, was the focus of the retreat.

At the heart of the presentations was the idea that "the story" in which we center our experience of life has been changing dramatically over the last century and that that change has, or could, dramatically impact our faith and our relationship with our Creator. The change that had taken place was the stunning advances of science, especially in the area of cosmology, the study of the universe.

Science and the remarkable Hubble Space Telescope now have provided evidence that this universe is as much as 13.7 billion years old, that there are billions of galaxies beyond our own Milky Way, and that the universe continues to expand at a astounding rate.

Since I barely made it through chemistry in high school, all of this was "awesome" news to me, to say the least.

Over the next two years I began studying contemporary theologians and spiritual writers like Judy Cannato and Dominican Cletus Wessels as well as giants like Teilhard de Chardin and Karl Rahner to try to see where this might be leading my own spirituality and faith. Another retreat in 2009 at the River's Edge with the Australia Michael Morwood, led me to incorporate the "New Story" into my own prayer and eventually into my preaching.

What is most amazing about all of this new knowledge is that it begins to deepen our understanding of the Divine Covenant that is so evident in all of creation. For all its primitive imagery, Genesis, the prophets and the psalmists had it right, and we're just now beginning to see just how right they were. From St. Francis' *Canticle of the Sun* down to our own day in Marty Haugen's joyful response to the magnificence of God's creation, all we can do is humbly rejoice:

The heavens are telling the glory of God And all creation is shouting for joy. Come dance in the forest Come play in the fields And sing, sing to the glory of the Lord.
