MAKE A JOYFUL NOISE UNTO THE LORD

Psalm 100:

Verse 1: Make a Joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. Verse 2: Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing.

Verse 3: Know ye that the Lord he is God: It is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves; We are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Verse 4: Enter into his gates with Thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: Be thankful unto him, and bless his name.

Verse 5: For the Lord is good; His mercy is everlasting; and His truth endureth to all generations.

What a powerful message this Psalm 100 gives to us. Every verse is a message by itself.

Verse 1 tells us to make a joyful noise unto the Lord. The first thought that comes to my mind is singing. When we sing the old hymns, and praise his name, we are making a joyful noise unto the Lord. God doesn't care if you sing off-key as long as your heart is right. Singing is one way we can praise and worship Him. In our world, singing is a universal form of making a joyful noise unto the Lord.

In our Masonic Ritual we find the words; "He decks the plumage of ten thousand warblers of His praise, that animate the wooded shade"....in other words, even the birds, sing his praises.

Illustrious Grand Master Grand Council of Kentucky, Royal and Select Masters 2003 – 2004

Jerome Herman Dean, 81, of Dayton, KY passed away at home on September 17, 2020. He was preceded in death by his wife, Karen Dean; Sister, Margaret Price; Brothers, John, Paul, Franklin and Jesse Dean Jr. He is survived by his son Scott Dean (Carolyne) and daughter Tracey (Thomas) Blackburn, along with 6 Grandchildren and 7 Great Grandchildren. Visitation was held at Cooper Funeral Home on Monday, September 21, 2020 and the funeral service on Tuesday, September 22, 2020. Burial followed in St. Stephens Cemetery in Ft. Thomas, KY.

Companion Dean's Masonic journey began in January of 1973 when he was initiated an Entered Apprentice at Henry Barnes Lodge No. 607, F&AM. He was passed to the degree of Fellow Craft the following month and raised a Master Mason in April of that year. A faithful member of his lodge, he advanced through the chairs and was elected three times as Master, serving in 1980, 1988 and 1989.

An active member of the York Rite, he was elected High Priest of Temple Chapter No. 33 in 1980, the same year he was first Master of his lodge; in 1982 he served as Illustrious Master of Jeffries Council No. 33, and in 1989 Commander of Newport Commandery No. 13.


He was elected to the Grand line of the Grand Council of Kentucky, Royal and Select Masters in September of 2000, and progressing through the chairs, was elected Illustrious Grand Master in September of 2003 at the one hundred seventy-sixth Annual Assembly. 

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

PROPOSED LEGISLATION GRAND CHAPTER OF KENTUCKY

My understanding is that the Resolutions to amend **Sections 13.A. and 6.B.** of the Constitution, dealing with the number of votes permitted by certain members of the Grand Chapter at Grand Session were **defeated**.

The following Resolution, as presented in the advance proceedings, to Amend **Section 208** by adding subsection 9 was **approved**.

Be it resolved:

Whereas: The Grand Lodge of Kentucky has officially recognized the PHGL as a sovereign body. The Grand Chapter shall here forth recognize the PHA Grand Chapter of Kentucky as a sovereign body. Membership shall be regulated as per the GL Constitution Resolution adopted according to the Most worshipful Grand Lodge of Kentucky and the Most Worshipful PHA Grand Lodge resolution adopted at the 215th Session of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky (2011) and allow inter-visitation without dual or or plural memberships as it was adopted at the 219th Grand Communication (2018) "FOR VISITATION ONLY".

THE MORE YOU KNOW

We return this month to Dr. Albert Mackey's "An Encyclopedia of Freemasonry" and the meaning of an important Masonic symbol. - Editor

The Corner-Stone

The corner-stone is the stone which lies at the corner of two walls, and forms the corner of the foundation of an edifice. In Masonic buildings it is now always placed in the north-east; but this rule was not always formerly observed. As the foundation on which the entire structure is supposed to rest, it is considered by Operative Masons as the most important stone in the edifice. It is laid with impressive ceremonies; the assistance of Speculative Masons is often, and ought always to be, invited to give dignity to the occasion; and for this purpose Freemasonry has provided an especial ritual which is to govern the proper performance of that duty.

Among the ancients the corner-stone of important edifices was laid with impressive ceremonies. These are well described by Tacitus in the history of the rebuilding of the Capitol. After detailing the preliminary ceremonies, which consisted in a procession of vestals, who with chaplets of flowers encompassed the ground and consecrated it by libations of living water, he adds that, after solemn prayer, Helvidius, to whom the care of rebuilding the Capitol had been committed, "laid his hand upon the fillets that adorned the foundation stone, and also the cords by which it was to be drawn to its place. In that instant the magistrates, the priests, the senators, the Roman knights, and a number of citizens, all acting with one effort and general demonstrations of joy, laid hold of the ropes and dragged the ponderous load to its destined spot. They then threw in ingots of gold and silver, and other metals which had never been melted in the furnace, but still retained, untouched by human art, their first formation in the bowels of the earth."

The symbolism of the corner-stone when duly laid with Masonic rites is full of significance, which refers to its form, to its situation, to its permanence, and to its consecration.

As to its form, it must be perfectly square on its surfaces, and in its solid contents a cube. Now the square is a symbol of morality, and the cube of truth. In its situation it lies between the north, the place of darkness, and the east, the place of light; and hence this position symbolizes the Masonic progress from darkness to light, and from ignorance to knowledge. The permanence and durability of the corner-stone, which lasts long after the building in whose foundation it was placed has fallen into decay, is intended to remind the Mason that, when this earthly house of his tabernacle shall have passed away, he has within him a sure foundation of eternal life—a corner-stone of immortality —an emanation from that Divine Spirit which pervades all nature, and which, therefore, must survive the tomb, and rise, triumphant and eternal, above the decaying dust of death and the grave.

The stone, when deposited in its appropriate place, is carefully examined with the necessary implements of Operative Masonry, — the square, the level, and the plumb, themselves all symbolic in meaning, —and is then declared to be "well formed, true, and trusty." Thus the Mason is taught that his virtues are to be tested by temptation and trial, by suffering and adversity, before they can be pronounced by the Master Builder of souls to be materials worthy of the spiritual building of eternal life, fitted, "as living stones, for that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

And lastly, in the ceremony of depositing the corner-stone, the elements of Masonic consecration are produced, and the stone is solemnly set apart by pouring corn, wine, and oil upon its surface, emblematic of the Nourishment, Refreshment, and Joy which are to be the rewards of a faithful performance of duty.

The corner-stone does not appear to have been adopted by any of the heathen nations, but to have been as the *eben pinah*, peculiar to the Jews, from whom it descended to the Christians. In the Old Testament, it seems always to have denoted a prince or high personage, and hence the Evangelists constantly use it in reference to Christ, who is called the " chief corner-stone." In Masonic symbolism, it signifies a true Mason, and therefore it is the first character which the Apprentice is made to represent after his initiation has been completed.

A Personal Letter to Our Members from the Editor

I wanted to share some thoughts this month about something that is very personal, and something that I share with a good number of you. I hope you take the time to read through the following article and take it to heart. ~ Editor



A surprising thing that I found as I traveled the state while Grand Commander is the number of our members who have been treated for prostate cancer. Almost everywhere that I traveled, after folks found out that I had been diagnosed with the disease, someone and talk about *their* prostate would come to me cancer. or their father/brother/uncle/friend. It is hard to put into words how much this meant, and still means to me; my father died from prostate cancer, and the shared bond with so many of my brothers helped me as my family and I went through the process of deciding how to deal with my diagnosis. Many prostate cancer patients are basically told to go home, keep an eye on things and live your life; your cancer will never progress to the stage where it will cause you problems. Mine, unfortunately, was a very aggressive type, and

my doctor only gave me the options of surgery or radiation treatment. The third option, slow, painful death, I had observed and was not one I wished to participate in. We chose surgery and the folks at UK Urology performed a complete prostatectomy. To date, I am cancer free and for the most part doing well.

I said all that to say this – **get your PSA checked**. I know it isn't recommended anymore, but if I had not, I would not today be editing this newsletter. The aggressive nature of my cancer was such that it would have soon spread, and I had no symptoms. I only had a rapidly increasing PSA reading. Get your PSA checked and establish your baseline. Your family doctor can do it, it only takes a simple blood test.

WHY - Prostate cancer is **the second most common cancer among men** in the US. (Skin cancer is the most common.) Each year more than 230,000 men are diagnosed. And, it's the **second leading cause of cancer death** in US men, behind only lung cancer. It is estimated that approximately **2,500 men will be diagnosed this year in Kentucky**, where it trails only lung cancer in the number of new cases.

Approximately one in nine men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during their lifetime. Look around your next York Rite Meeting. At least one man there, on average, has or will have prostate cancer. The average age at diagnosis is about 66, about the average age of our fraternity. About 1 man in 41 will die of prostate cancer. It can be a serious disease, but most men diagnosed with prostate cancer do not die from it. In fact, more than 3.1 million men in the United States who have been diagnosed with prostate cancer at some point are still alive today. Early detection can be critical for cases like mine.

Keep in mind that **an elevated PSA does not necessarily mean cancer**. Infection, inflammation, or enlarged prostate all can cause elevated numbers. Your doctor can give you guidance, and may want to try antibiotics or anti-inflammatory medication first. In my case, my PSA continued to steadily rise and medications did not help.

Also keep in mind that a **diagnosis does not necessarily require treatment**. Many men have been diagnosed with a very slow growing type of cancer that does not require treatment at all.

There are arguments against testing and you should talk with your doctor about them. A strong argument for testing, in my opinion, is that the reported incidence of advanced stage prostate cancer is on the rise, due to fewer tests being performed. If you only go to the doctor after you begin to have problems, you are much more likely to have a more advanced stage, requiring more aggressive treatment. You may get put through some uncomfortable procedures for nothing, and you may get put through some worry. I had two (very uncomfortable) negative biopsies and was assured by my then Urologist that my chances of ever having prostate cancer were almost nil. And my PSA kept climbing. Was he ever wrong!

Ultimately, I have written this because I think knowledge is always better than ignorance, and I would encourage you, get tested. "Knowledge is power", as the old saying goes, and knowledge allows you to make informed decisions. "Ignorance is bliss", and could cost you your life. A simple blood test could save it. It did mine.

THOUGHTS ON LEADERSHIP

The following material has been taken from a number of sources. I have not referenced any one in particular because so many of them offer basically different wording of the same thing. Probably one of the most important during the present situation is the advice given by Randy Goruk at leadersedge360.com: "Recognize that leadership during difficult times, like now, is not much different than any other time."

GOOD LEADERSHIP

Good leadership is about having clear goals and a plan to reach them. My experience is that our leadership, both elected and informal, far too often have neither, and when that rare leader comes along who does, it is almost impossible to overcome the inertia of doing nothing. Ask yourself the questions "Why do we exist as an organization? What are we 'selling'?" An organization that doesn't know the reason for its existence can't pass that on to prospective members, and can't set clear goals to accomplish that purpose. This is the first question we must establish a clear answer to before we can prepare leaders to reverse our membership losses.

Good leadership is about human relationships. Caring about and encouraging the people you interact with; communicating with the people you interact with; involving the people you interact with. Some of the best administrative people that I know are the worst leaders because they never involve those around them and they don't communicate with them. People need to know they are important and needed; communication is necessary for them to know that. People want to know what's going on, what the goal is and the plan to attain it; how they can participate and that they are vitally important to the accomplishment of the goal.

Good leadership is about good character. Always do the right thing. Any behaviors which damage your credibility takes away from your effectiveness. 'My way is the only way' is a recipe for failure. Doing whatever it takes to get your way reduces others' confidence in and respect for you and your abilities and in the long run damages the organization, even if it's done for 'the best of the organization.'

Good leadership is about accountability. Don't wait for somebody else to do it; don't expect somebody else to do it. You are the leader. Step up. Prepare yourself and lead.


Good leadership is about learning. Learn from your mistakes; learn from your successes; learn how to better accomplish the goal. Fail effectively. Acknowledge your mistakes and learn from them; don't quit; move on. Utilize the wisdom of the elders, the experts, those whom you respect. Look at what they do and see how you can adapt their methods to your personality.

Good leadership is about teamwork. Surround yourself with good people. People who can and will help you accomplish your goals; People who are knowledgeable and want to see the organization succeed; People who will accept a challenge and work to meet it. 'Yes men' and 'good old boys' may be good to hang out with and drink a beer, but they will seldom help make you to be a successful leader.

Good leadership is about being mentally tough. You as the leader are the one who must have to courage, the mental fortitude, to make the decisions and to implement them. Never lose sight of the ultimate goal you have set; your vision of where you want to take your organization; what is best for the organization. Stay grounded in the values and principles which define your character. Be prepared, be flexible to change the plan as to how you will accomplish those goals if circumstances or your team changes.

I'm sure you can come up with others, but I'm also confident that the application of these ideas can reverse our present membership issues. We are all volunteers and we all asked to be a part of this organization; We can also all be a part in its renewal.
