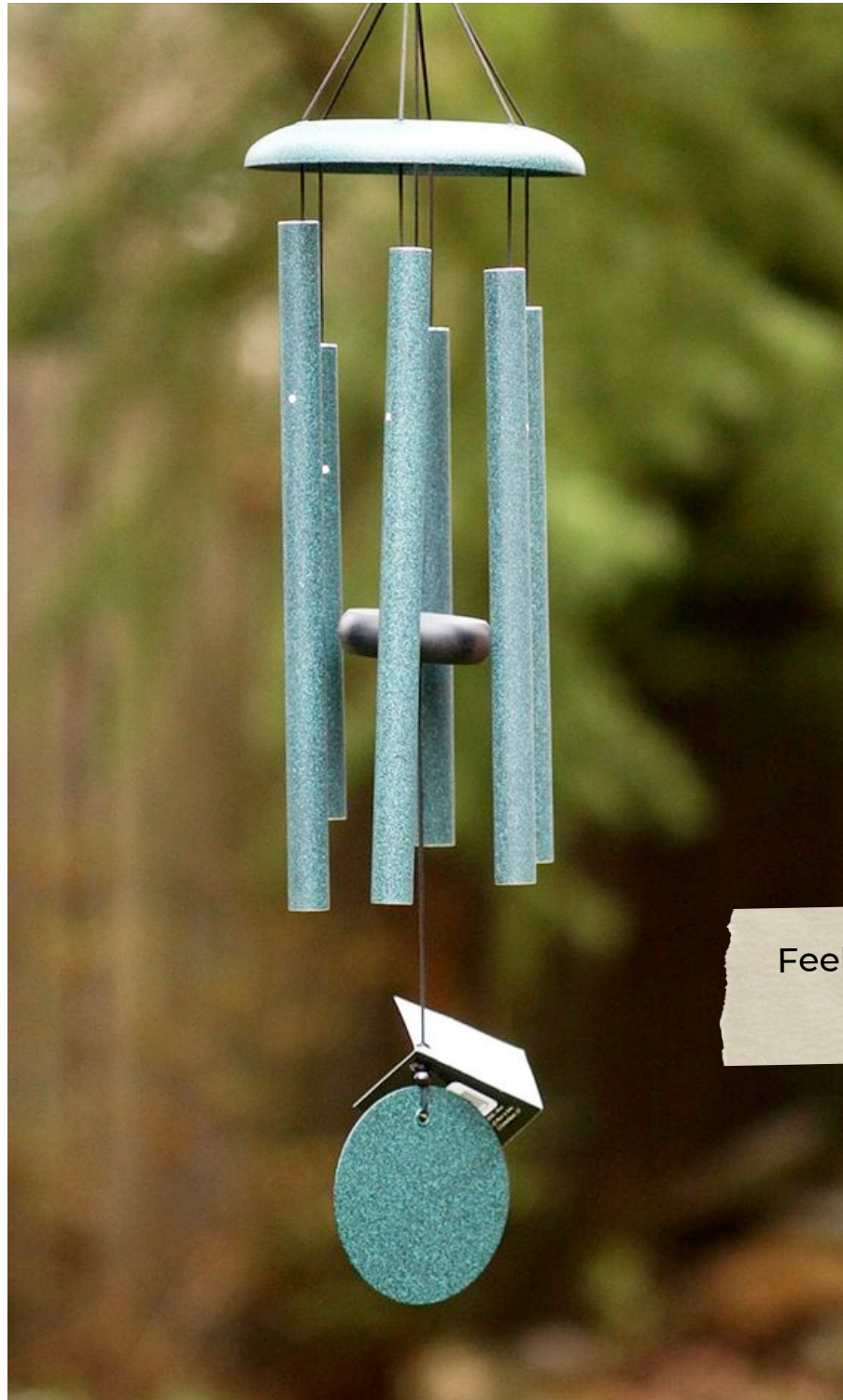


A Personal touch

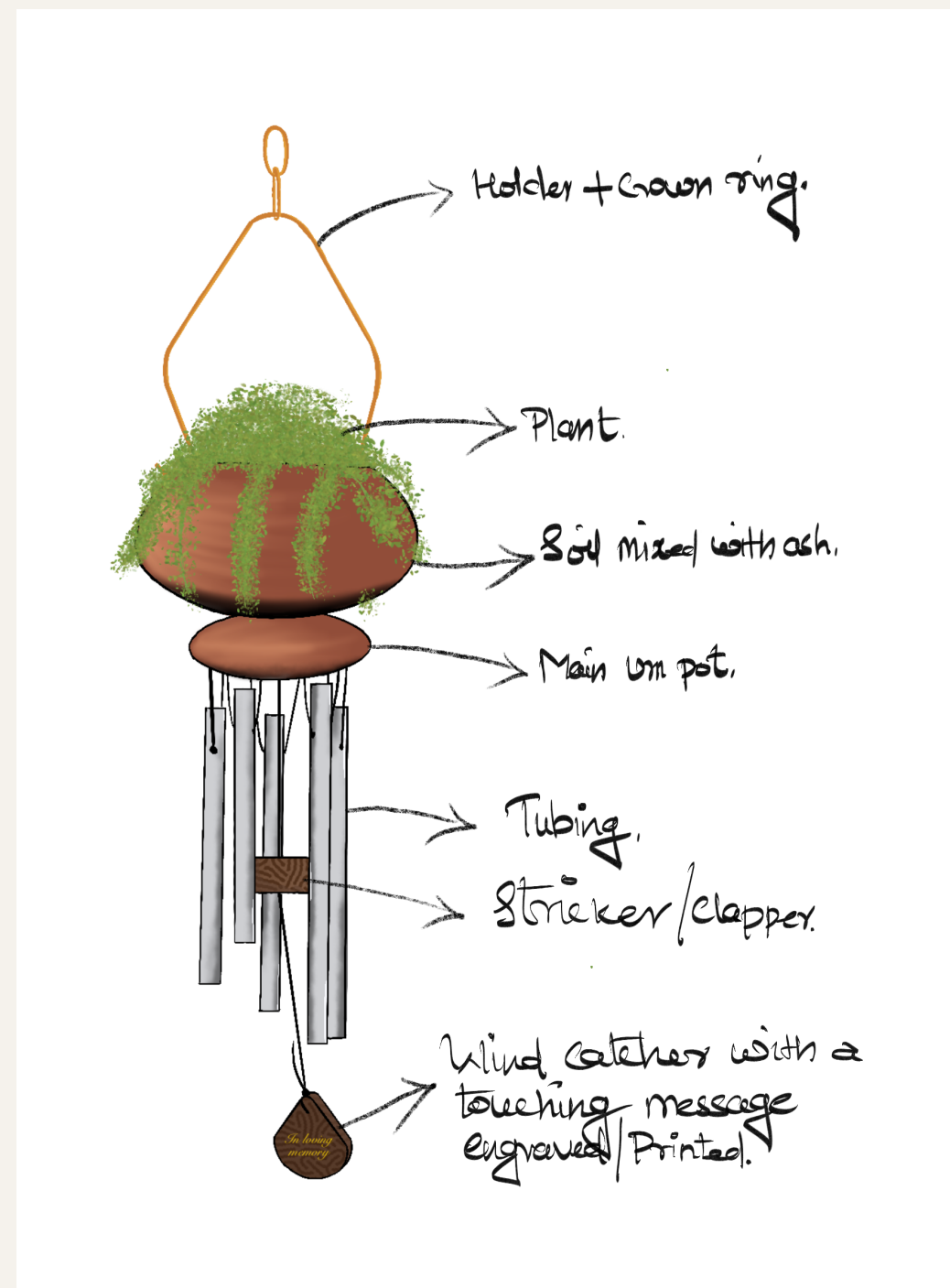

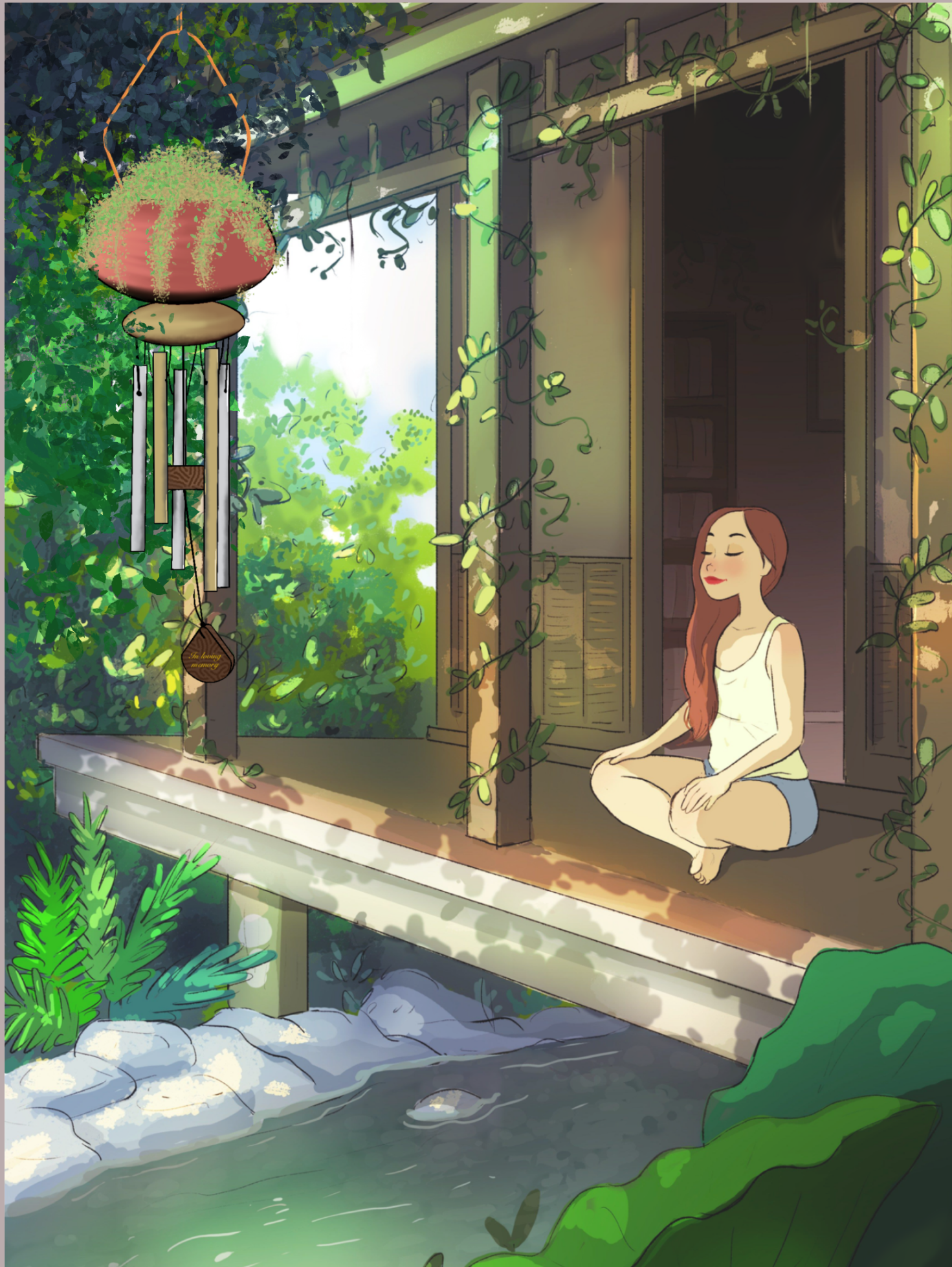


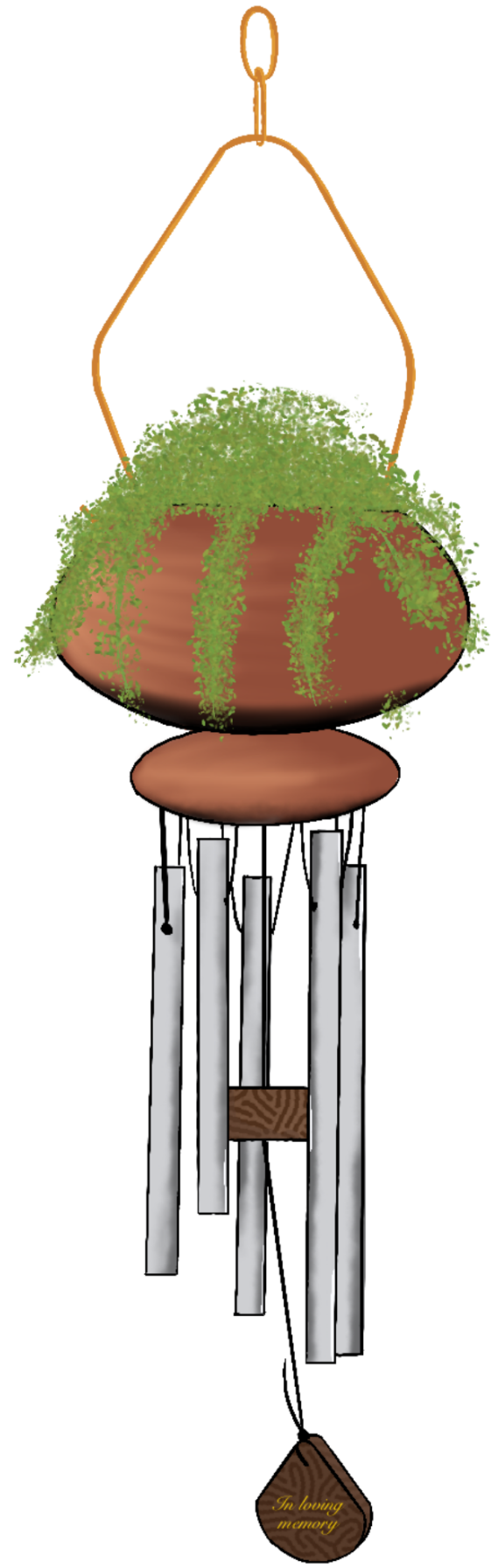
Design concept

In my design I have modified the traditional urn into a plant pot combined with a wind chime. As ashes are natural manure, some of the ashes can be mixed with the soil for growing plants and the rest can be stored in the pot below. The wind chime parts will be attached to the main urn pot. When the wind chime moves around and rings, it will give us a feeling of our departed loved ones' soul living amongst us and the growing plant gives a sense of afterlife. The wind catcher can also be engraved with a personal message in order to customise the urn.
