School stays on the move!

In 2015, four key areas were identified as part of the education strategy for the Zermatt, Täsch, and Randa school region. The goal of individual support for all students (Key Area I) is to create optimal learning opportunities for all schoolchildren.

The process of teaching development, the actual core business, will be a central focus in the region's schools in the coming school year.

Curriculum 21

From August, schools in Upper Valais will be teaching according to the Curriculum 21 (see "Zermatt Inside" from April 2018). During the last school year, as well as before and after the summer holidays, the school administration and teachers were trained to use the Curriculum 21. It builds on proven methods and takes new pedagogical developments into account. The goal is the best possible support for all schoolchildren. The new curriculum is more focused on students not accumulating factual knowledge, but primarily on being able to apply it. Instead of learning objectives, the curriculum redefines competencies. These describe what the students should know and be able to do at the end of their compulsory schooling. On the one hand, the teachers design tasks that are subject-specific and methodologically diverse; on the other, they lead the class and support the

Students in their learning through subject didactics.

In this context, lesson development is not limited to simply "checking off" goals listed in a plan, but rather to the implementation of competency-oriented teaching in everyday school life – a didactic challenge!

Technical adjustments

The subject "Humans and the Environment" is taught in "Nature, Humanity and Society" and additionally integrates topics on community and society, basic experiences, values and norms, as well as encounters with religions and worldviews. The subject "Bible" is no longer listed in the timetable, and the interdenominational aspects of the NMG subject have been expanded.



The new curriculum – a new challenge not only for the students, but also for the teachers

continues to have its place in the timetable. Furthermore, the schoolchildren develop their Skills in basic writing, make their first attempts at typing with the «Typewriter» program from 6H onwards and apply their knowledge with the new

Teaching materials "Blickpunkt" and "NaTech". Interdisciplinary curricula such as "Education for Sustainable Development" and, in the school year after next, "Media and Information Technology," as well as the replacement of other teaching materials, continue the process.

Individualized Support: The

school's special education teachers, together with the teachers, launched the "Support Kit" project during the last school year . The goal was to develop materials and approaches to better support both strong and weaker students in the classroom. After a pilot phase, the support kit will be used in the new school year.

Furthermore, individual learning is further promoted within the framework of smaller projects such as the "Chur Teaching Model" or "Professional Learning Relationships . "

Strengthening teaching teams

The attitude of "Me and my class" has shifted significantly to "We and our school." Teachers have gone from being lone warriors to being part of a teaching team. As class teachers, they work daily with various subject teachers.

They work together in and around the classroom (German for foreign language teachers, special education teachers, textile design specialists, secondary school departments, etc.) and in grade level teams. Together, they are responsible for planning and conducting lessons.

As part of the collegial observation (ge-


Through mutual classroom visits, teachers provide feedback on specific topics. In addition, the teacher is responsible for various interfaces.

(Center for Development and Therapy, school social work, etc.). School and teaching development processes are more successful when teachers work together, develop their teaching and skills jointly, and thus relieve each other's workload. This process should be consistently pursued.

Promote cohesion

Throughout the school year, various events are held to enhance school cohesion, including regional training sessions with the Täsch/Randa school region and class projects such as Exchange Week, visits to and from Japan, Christmas concerts, school transfers, brass band classes, art classes, sports events, forest days, career fairs, taster weeks, career explorations, career discovery, plays, and presentations of secondary schools (OMS, faculty, vocational school, preapprenticeship class, etc.). These events allow children, young people, and teachers to experience community and build new relationships.

The school of the future is a learning school that examines learning and teaching, asks the right questions, and develops thoughtfully. As school authorities, parents, teachers, and students, we don't stand still, but rather strive to consolidate and deepen the projects we have begun , and move forward together. Let's keep moving!

New waste regulations – introduction of private containers

On June 10, 2018, the citizens of Zermatt approved the revision of the waste regulations and fee schedule. The approval process with the Council of State has been initiated and is currently pending. As soon as the revised waste regulations are approved, the public will be informed immediately.

A significant change in the new regulations is the elimination of private containers. All private

their waste to the public Garbage sheds or at the designated

Dispose of at designated locations.

In November 2016, the affected

Private households have already been informed in writing that the waste disposal service provider (Schwendimann AG) will collect these containers after homologation. We will inform the affected individuals/private households of the details (time period/sectoral breakdown, etc.) as soon as the waste regulations are homologated.

Operating container

Catering establishments (hotels and restaurants) will continue to receive fee-based operating containers for the disposal of their waste upon request. Upon justified request, other service or commercial establishments may be granted

Coding system

Due to waste regulations, a collection label will be required in the future for the collection/emptying of a company container (including bio-containers, glass, municipal waste).

To simplify this, the EWG, together with the company Schwendimann AG and the Oberwallis fee association. has

The introduction of a coding system was decided

The codes for the operating containers were scanned on site by Schwendimann AG (number of operating containers and containers with municipal waste)

The EWG then invoices the companies for the use of the fee seals and collection stamps based on the scanned container codes



She chose this tourist destination because of her heart. Today, she's well integrated and dreams of introducing the locals to Cuban dance skills. In this issue, you'll find out where she likes to hang out and what she recommends to future newcomers.

Where are you from and where were you born?

"I grew up as the youngest of three children in Santa Fe, about 15 minutes from Havana, Cuba."

Where do you currently work?

"After working in various restaurants, I have been working as a nursing assistant at the Zermatt retirement home since June 2017, which I really enjoy."

In what context did you first hear about Zermatt? When was that?

«My husband and I met in Cuba in 2003.

It was from him that I first heard about Zermatt and its impressive mountain scenery. And also about the snow, which we don't experience in Cuba."

What was your personal motivation for coming to Zermatt?

"I came to Zermatt because of my marriage in February 2004."

Do you still remember the first meeting in Zermatt?

If so, which ones are they?

"I first vacationed here in Zermatt for three months in the winter of 2003/04 to get to know the place and the climate. The first person I met was my father-in-law. It was also during this time that I first tried skiing."

How do you like to spend a day off?

"With the family, but especially I do a lot with the children, as they have different hobbies."

Law on the Promotion of Mountain Railways

The law promoting mountain railways is unique in Switzerland and serves as a model for other cantons. It proposes the creation of a mountain railway fund that will provide between CHF 205 million and CHF 300 million for investments in the Valais mountain railways. This fund will be funded with CHF 17 million annually.

Non-repayable grants are only awarded for extraordinary investments of regional importance, such as mountain-valley connections or mergers of ski resorts. For such important projects, the canton can grant non-repayable subsidies of up to CHF 4 million per project.

Companies wishing to receive a CHF 4 million subsidy for their ski-to-valley railway line or mountain-to-valley connection must demonstrate, with the help of a detailed business plan, that the newly planned infrastructure meets the necessary requirements and that its continued existence can be guaranteed in the medium term. Repayable loans and guarantees are a central pillar of this law . However, this only applies to companies with a sufficient EBITDA. Railways with an EBITDA margin above 25 percent can receive a maximum of 50 percent in the form of loans and guarantees. For railways with an EBITDA between 20 and 25 percent, financial assistance of a maximum of 20 percent is granted for a project.

The law to promote mountain railways was passed with 104 votes in favor and 25 against.

FIGI Fund

sen. Parliament welcomes this step, and its advocacy has not been contested. The Canton of Valais has real estate assets valued at approximately CHF 1.4 billion. This includes more than 550 properties, including schools, prisons, police stations, studios, offices, and courthouses.

The need for investment increases annually, and to adequately address this situation, all state-owned real estate should be managed by the FIGI fund (Fund for Financing Investments and Management of State-Owned Real Estate). The fund should have the right to borrow up to CHF 500 million . The Grand Council can adjust the upper limit upwards or downwards annually.

The law was passed in one reading with 105 votes in favour and 20 against.

Building regulations

The building regulations that came into force on January 1, 2018, require that basements may only protrude one meter above the ground.

Otherwise, they are counted as full floors. In effect, this means that an entire floor is lost, which represents a huge loss of value and a clear deterioration of the previous regulations. The Grand Council has rectified this situation and now

the basements protrude two meters above the ground, which represents a massive improvement for the landowners.

The Grand Council unanimously approved the correction to the building regulations with 126 yes votes.

On the Friday of the May session, the elections for the Presidency of the Grand Council traditionally take place. Diego Wellig from Naters held this office for a year with great foresight, sensitivity, and wit. Standing ovations and countless words of thanks from all factions and

The results underscored Diego Wellig's brilliant work. Anne-Marie Sauthier-Luyet was elected as her successor, the highest-ranking Valaisan woman, with a brilliant result of 126 votes.

First Vice President is Gilles Martin of the CVP, and second Vice President is Olivier Turin of the Left Alliance.

Constitutional Council

The decree on the Constitutional Council was adopted without major votes . The decree, presented by the Council of State, regulates the Constitutional Council's inauguration. It also determines its organization and establishes its relationship with the cantonal authorities and the population.

The Constitutional Council is organized into committees. It has a Secretary General who provides the necessary support for the execution of its work. It elects its Secretary General and consults one or more experts.

The Grand Council approves annually, within the framework of the state budget, the funds required for the operation of the Constitutional Council.

The members of the Constitutional Council receive the same compensation as the members of the Grand Council. No later than four years after the constitutive session, the Constitutional Council submits a draft of the new constitution to the

Parliament adopted the decree with 114 votes in favor and eight abstentions. A second reading was waived unanimously by 125 votes.

Tradition, modernity and soulful nature – Zermatt's sister town Myoko

While the West fades away, we have been experiencing a Far Eastern awakening for several decades. The prelude to this exotic dance was, as its sonorous nickname suggests, "the Empire of the Rising Sun."



Like Great Britain, so aptly described by its motto "Splendid Isolation," Japan is an island empire and, as such, experienced a completely different development than the continental "Middle Kingdom." Japan's hearts beat differently! Certainly, writing and certain traces of Confucianism came there from China.

Buddhism originated in India, but in Japan it merged with the native Shintoism, which tends towards animism.

Superficially, all Far Eastern guests appear similar to a Western eye. However, Japanese are usually finely dressed, and their behavior, even when they appear in groups, appears extremely stylish. In Japan, no cultural revolution has taken place, turning everything upside down . On the contrary, traditions are cultivated there, and—sometimes taking strange forms—socially graded forms of politeness are practically stylized.

Zen as a leitmoti

Japan's unique civilization, apart from its aforementioned island location, can be traced primarily to Zen. Zen, as "silent understanding," is an ethical and pedagogical attitude that permeates all Far Eastern work as a leitmotif. While Western culture emphasizes subjectively expressive creativity, Eastern culture persists in humble veneration of traditional forms and carefully refined execution. The path is the destination!

Japan was the first non-Western country to catch up technologically with Europe and the USA.

It would be too easy to explain this feat of civilizational strength, accomplished nowhere else so rapidly and on such a scale, with a "talent for copying." Rather, it is based on a determined, disciplined mentality that permeates the entire society, which in turn is based, among other things, on the island's location, Zen, and, of course, a pronounced nationalism.

Subsequently, it developed into an imperial power, fighting the First World War as an ally and the Second World War with the Axis, but overstepping the mark with the fatal attack on Pearl Harbor. Although its imperial dreams were dashed after the defeat of 1945, its "will to power" soon transformed the Land of the Rising Sun into a global economic giant.

Period." After unification, it remained in a cautious cycle of isolation and openness. Around 1868, the United States forced access to the Japanese markets through a naval force. Japan woke up abruptly and stunned the entire world with its victory in the Russo-

mountains Zermatt has long been twinned with Myokokogen, the tourist resort in the (Japanese) Central Alps that merged with Arai and Myoko to form Myoko City. It also maintains a friendship with the former imperial city of Kyoto and now also with the city on Lake Kawaguchi.



and Fujikawaguchiko, located at the foot of the sacred Fuji-San (only in the west it is called Fujiyama).

As with us, the inhospitable mountains in Japan, inhabited by gods and spirits, were once avoided out of a mixture of reverence and – rice only grew on the fertile plains – pure utilitarianism. With industrialization, the need for relaxation in pristine nature arose. According to Shintoism, nature, as so delicately depicted in woodcuts by earlier masters, is animated. This is why the scenic beauty of Japan is so highly valued.

Not far from Myoko, Mount Hiuchi, one of Japan's most beautiful mountains, rises to nearly 2,500 meters. At its feet, the dreamy Lake Koya imbues the landscape with an ethereal atmosphere. It's no wonder that the town, overlooked by the other peaks of Madarao, Kurohime, Togakushi, Lizuna, and, of course, the sacred Myoko-san, has become Japan's most important tourist destination.

Myoko City now has a population of approximately 40,000, who earn their living primarily from tourism, but also from industry and the service sector. Japan's most popular summer and winter resort has much to offer: Although only about 200 meters above sea level, it is snow-sure, boasts hot springs, and—Japan's favorite—five golf courses. A curious feature is the cleverly designed snow removal system: Wherever possible, hot spring water is piped onto the streets.

"There is nothing good unless you do it"

The bridge-builders for this successful twinning were the then mayor of Zermatt, Robert Guntern, the former resort director Amadé Perrig, and – last but not least – the tourism pioneer Tsuyoshi Ueki from Myoko. At his invitation, the Guntern and Perrig couples visited the famous tourist destination in 1994. Four years later, a delegation from Zermatt traveled to Myoko, brought the avalanche dog Nomo as a thoughtful gift, and agreed on the twinning. The following winter, several Zermatt ski instructors even taught at Ueki's ski school. Notables and groups of students from Zermatt have already been privileged to travel to Japan several times and experience unique hospitality . In return, a team of celebrities and students from Myoko visited Zermatt. This spring, a Zermatt delegation , led by mayor Romy Biner, once again traveled to Myoko. Thanks to these visits and an established student exchange program, a harmonious friendship developed between the two Alpine "Meccas ." An understanding that, like the Myoko Club founded in Zermatt, deserves a closer look.

The Gornergrat Railway is purchasing five new double-decker trains, which will enter service in 2021. Andreas Schmid of the Matterhorn Gotthard Railway/Gornergrat Railway is the project manager and provides insight into the ongoing procurement process.

Andreas, you've been working on the new Gornergrat Railway project for seven months now. What were and are the biggest challenges in your opinion?

"The greatest difficulty was defining common requirements with the various internal interest groups .

The wishes were varied, but it is impossible to take all of them into account.

In several workshops, we worked through over 220 topics, discussing and negotiating each one. The different requirements challenged us in the project meetings and will certainly remain a topic throughout the entire procurement process. Of course, a challenge for me as project manager is to ensure that everyone involved is heard sufficiently, to weigh the pros and cons accordingly, and to bring the team to a common understanding."



Why do we need new trains? Most of them are in good or even excellent condition.

"On peak days, vehicles that are 57 years old are used (motor vehicles Bhe 2/4 3019-3022). Among other things, these vehicles need to be replaced due

We also want to change the Gornergrat Railway to a 20-minute cycle instead of the 24-minute cycle.

"We are introducing a more frequent service. To achieve this, the trains must be able to run faster. which isn't possible with the old vehicles. With the new locomotives, we can implement this frequency

And what happens to the cars that are scrapped?

«The cars will be returned to the recycling cycle, which means they will be scrapped.

At most, one vehicle will remain as a historic railcar on the Gornergrat Railway, as these vehicles have shaped the Gornergrat and the railway for a

Today, a car is no longer just a means of transport from A to B, but must also cover many different needs, e.g.

Requirements of customers, operations, etc. How is this ensured in the project?

"A project team was assembled with at least one participant per area. The tasks were transparent, and everyone could contribute as needed.

Should the vehicles be made more similar to the existing ones? Do you want to slightly optimize the design, thus creating a small evolution? Or even revolutionize the appearance, thus introducing something completely new! We'll know when the trains are delivered..."

If you compare the future vehicle fleet with the current one, what are the biggest differences?

"The new vehicles will be closely based on the railcars from 2006 (Bhe 4/6 3081-3084). However, the differences compared to the vehicles they are replacing will be clear: The vehicles have low-floor entrances, a modern customer information system, can travel faster to the Gornergrat, and are smoother. These technical innovations naturally mean that the nostalgic flair is lost. But they also have something in common with the older vehicles. Like them, some of them will have opening windows.

Is there a special name for the new fleet?

"The new vehicles will be called POLARIS; 'Popular Landscape Railway in Switzerland'."

And finally, very important for all bike fans: how many bike hooks are provided?

"The concept for the multifunctional compartment is not yet finalized. Bicycle racks are planned, but the exact number is still open."

A successful financial year for the Burgergemeinde Zermatt – third-highest total turnover in history

At the Citizens' Assembly last June, the Zermatt Civic Community was able to look back on a successful 2017 financial year.

Total sales increased by 11% to CHF 32.8 million. At the same time, the Citizens' Assembly set the course for a

future-oriented restructuring.

Solid financial year

The Zermatt Civic Community increased its revenue by CHF 3.3 million to CHF 32.8 million in the 2017 financial year. Positive revenue growth was reported in all business segments, with the highest increase in revenue at 17.1% in accommodation revenue. Cash flow increased by 17.2% in the past financial year, amounting to CHF 5.1 million. The Civic Community closed the financial year with an annual profit of CHF 0.2 million.

Investments of CHF 7.1 million made

In the 2017 financial year, the Burger Community also carried out extensive renovations in its hotels and restaurants.

In order to continue to meet the ever-increasing demands of guests, the investment focus was on the Grand Hotel Zermatterhof, with around CHF 4.7 million invested. In addition to a roof renovation, the entire fifth floor was completely renovated. Furthermore, the garden of the

Five-star hotels in the heart of Zermatt will have an attractive new garden terrace.

Larger investments were also made in the Hotel Continental and the Ristorante Pizzeria on the Rothorn.

Restructuring decided

The Burgergemeinde Zermatt as a public corporation pursues the

Operation of hotels and restaurants

practically exclusively for private commercial purposes. As a result, a complex and at times cumbersome organizational structure has developed over time. The Citizens' Assembly has now created the conditions for the development of a modern and future-oriented restructuring. Firstly, it approved the merger of the Matterhorn Group with Matterhorn Group Management AG and, secondly, the leasing of the hotels and restaurants to Matterhorn Group Management AG. Accordingly, the real estate will remain with the Zermatt Citizens' Community, while the operation of the hotels and restaurants will be outsourced to Matterhorn Group Management AG, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Zermatt Citizens' Community.

Outlook for the 2017/2018 financial year

Thanks to the economic recovery in the Eurozone and the positive economic development in Asia and North America, the Zermatt community has had a good start to the 2017/2018 financial year. Sales in the first half of the year increased by

CHF 0.6 million to CHF 22.3 million . This was despite the natural events in January and the closure of the Unterrothorn cable car before Easter negatively impacting the earnings situation.




Final spurt on Europe's highest construction site

Glacier Ride construction site resumed on January 30th this winter, and the removal of the snow masses took up a considerable amount of time, the spring was all about making up for lost time. After a busy early summer, the

final work on this unique project

is currently underway.

After work on the Matterhorn



Difficult conditions on the Klein

Anyone who took a look at the construction site of the new 3S cable car at Klein

Matterhorn certainly couldn't have imagined that the Matterhorn Glacier Ride would be in operation the following fall . All that was visible of the future cable car station was the rock excavation and the concrete foundation.

In January, the construction workers returned to Klein Matterhorn to press ahead with construction. Unfortunately, the weather conditions of last winter significantly slowed construction progress.

Again and again, heavy equipment had to be used to clear meter-high layers of snow.

Storms and temperatures as low as minus 32°C have slowed down construction work

The situation was no different at the transfer point in Cime Laghi, where the construction material is prepared and temporarily stored . Here, too, the construction

material had to be exposed so that the construction site could be supplied.

Finally, the next steps towards the completion of the mountain station could be taken. In mid-February,

Formwork and concreting of the rear support were thus completed, so that the electromechanical parts of the 3S track could be installed between mid-April and mid-Mav

The heart of the two ten-ton electric motors consists

10,000 individual parts. Due to their weight, the two electric motors had to be disassembled before being hoisted into place by a construction crane

Construction of the facade began at the end of

May . The massive wooden beams were installed at breakneck speed, and the first roof elements were installed at the beginning of July.

It took about three weeks to complete the construction and permanently install the panels. At

So far, the rough construction work has been completed and only the fine adjustments and the interior work remain until the inauguration in

and the commissioning of the electromechanical

The cable pull on the downhill side te was already completed at the end of June. The two suspension cables are after a long journey from Romanshorn to Cervinia and

The cable was then successfully installed to Trockener Steg. The traction cable was then pulled up to the mountain station. The other half of the cable car followed, and its installation was completed about a month later . Thus, all the important parts for commissioning the 3S cable car are on site and installed.

The finishing touches at the valley station

At the valley station on Trockener Steg, the shell construction has been completed for some time, and the interior work is in the final stages. LEITNER ropeways installed the electromechanical components and completed the final adjustment work on the garage and switches at the end of June. the same time, the concrete for the control room was pour leatest the electromechanics, including the garage and switches, a setup booth was brought from Cervinia in March.

> Another milestone was the delivery of the new designer cabins. On July 4 and 5, the first batch of cabins was delivered by Cervinia her with a heavy-lift helicopter

Five questions for...?

Klaus, you're a foreman on the construction site of the Matterhorn Glacier Ride on the Klein Matterhorn. What's it like working on Europe's highest construction site?

"Of course, the construction site is a unique workplace. The best part isn't even the height or the view, but rather the overall conditions. I really enjoy working for Zermatt Bergbahnen. Even on previous projects, I was impressed by the friendly atmosphere within the team. The collaboration between cable car mechanics, electricians, construction managers, and management works flawlessly.

If you need help, you get it immediately. After many projects and several years on construction sites in Zermatt, I've made many friends and almost consider myself a ZBAG employee."

What does it mean for the body to do physical work at almost 4,000 meters above sea level?

"The physical strain is certainly greater than working down in the valley. Withstanding such stress isn't always easy either. I can feel how my body is suffering; after all, I've been working at such altitudes for over 23 years as a construction worker and foreman. At some point, the time will come when my body reaches its limits and I have to stop working at such altitudes. For example, I recently went to donate blood. The test showed that altitude training has given me about 12 percent more red blood cells than normal. So, the constant ups and downs are also good training for my heart."

After three years of construction, what do you like to think back on?

"I actually think back on the entire construction period with pleasure. Every bad experience also leaves something good behind. When something went wrong, for example, a mistake during the concreting, I

I saw it more as a challenge to fix the problem as quickly as possible. I fondly remember the moments when, for example, the carpenter placed his beams and they fit perfectly on the concrete bases. These are always crucial moments that sometimes cause sleepless nights. But when everything finally fits, it's a huge relief."

What was the most difficult challenge you and your team had to overcome?

«The weather on the Klein Matterhorn is certainly always a challenge.

Temperatures well below zero and strong winds sometimes make it difficult to perform physical work. When bad weather persists for several days, sometimes weeks, motivation drops, and it's not always easy to keep the team in good spirits. Logistics is another challenge. There's always a lack of space on the construction site, and coordination between the individual companies is therefore very important, but sometimes difficult to organize. The biggest challenge, however, is always ensuring that safety precautions are not neglected under the intense time pressure. Since these are very time-consuming, the time pressure increases. You have to be very careful to ensure that safety is not neglected."

The railway will be inaugurated in just under two months.


Are you happy to leave the rigorous work at this altitude behind you?

"I'm certainly happy that something new has come out of this work. It's always nice to see a project you've worked on for several years go into operation. That always fills me with pride. I hope to continue to realize cable car projects for Zermatt Bergbahnen in the future. I've gotten used to the rigorous work, and I enjoy working at heights.

My wish is to work on such projects until I retire in seven years. For me, it's perfect here in Zermatt. My work, and I as a person, are always valued here. I'm looking forward to seeing the Matterhorn Glacier Ride cabins make their first rounds. Of course, I won't miss the opportunity to climb aboard as a passenger and enjoy the ride myself."





Zermatt Open Air Theatre 2019: The First Woman on the Matterhorn

In summer 2019, an openair theatre will be held on Riffelberg for the third time. ater. Livia Anne Richard brings the story of Lucy Walker, the first woman to the Matterhorn, to the stage in a world premiere.

Performances will run from mid-July to early September.

On July 21, 1871, at a time when female mountaineering was frowned upon and dismissed as inferior, the Englishwoman Lucy Walker, wearing a long, white flannel dress, became the first woman in the world to reach the summit of the Matterhorn. This incredible achievement made Walker famous overnight in England— not least because of the scandal her actions caused: Lucy Walker was a noblewoman, and in these circles, working and participating in sports—let alone mountaineering — was not only frowned upon but outright forbidden for a woman. Lucy took a stand and went her own way —straight up.

Premiere of an exciting story

Director and author Livia Anne Richard, who has already written and directed the plays "The Matterhorn Story" and "Romeo and Juliet on the Gornergrat," will again stage a world premiere in

Gornergrat," will again stage a world premiere in 2019 – the title of the play has not yet been determined. "In this play,

The Matterhorn and life in Zermatt 150 years ago are at the center," explains Livia Anne Richard. There is a lot to tell surrounding the story of this first female ascent . Richard wants to do it with a humorous wink. Not only is Walker the first woman to attempt the mythical mountain, but the fact that she brings mountain guides from Meiringen with her is also frowned upon in Zermatt. Furthermore, there are rumors in the village that Melchior Anderegg, one of the Meiringen mountain guides, has a relationship with Lucy Walker that goes beyond just climbing the mountains together. And this despite the fact that he has a wife and twelve children at home in Meiringen. It goes without saying that such behavior is not approved by the strictly Catholic people of Zermatt.

During this time, conflicts also arise in Zermatt families: While the men ner sees mountain guiding as a new and

Since they often discover the only source of income for miles around, the women are largely left to their own devices at home, taking care of the children, the livestock, cooking, washing, and sewing. And the fact that their husbands are now also going mountaineering with elegant ladies in beautiful dresses, while they toil away from the hardships of life, is, of course, not exactly a source of joy.

Multilingual piece

After the multilingual approach proved successful in the production of "The Matterhorn Story," the new piece will also be spoken in German, English, and Valais German. "The dialogues are written so that someone can understand the story even if they only speak one of the three languages," explains Livia Anne Richard. This is certainly a great advantage for the tourist audience. There will also be translations.

translations into various other languages.

The stage will once again be set up on Riffelberg.

A total of 31 performances are planned from July 11 to September 1, starting Thursday through Saturday at 7:30 p.m. and starting Sunday at 3:00 p.m. The grandstand has a capacity of 700 seats and is uncovered.



When the Queen of the Matterhorn is chosen

On August 19, 2018, Zermatt will host a very special spectacle: for the first time, a cow fight will be held in the Matterhorn village.

The rules of cow fighting

The animals are divided into three categories according to their age: cows, first-milking and cattle.

A fight is considered lost if an animal refuses to fight or clearly turns away from its opponent.

Animals that lost three fights are eliminated.

 The elimination process continues until only seven animals remain. They then closing all together.

The Herens cow that bests all others in its category is considered the winner. It also happens that no cow beats all others. In this case, two cows are classified in the same rank.

"It will be a big celebration," says the OC President Toni Lauber and means the summer stechfest, which will take place in Zermatt on Sunday, August 19, 2018. Over one hundred Herens cows will compete in the cow fight and win the title of "Reine du Cervin" make up each other.

4,000 visitors expected

Especially for the Summer Festival, which takes place annually but for the first time in Zermatt , the municipality of Zermatt has created an event space in Zen Stecken that resembles a natural arena. The area, which until a few years ago housed a gravel pit, has recently been vacant. In addition to the spectator seating on the meadow on the slope, the organizers will build three grandstands with room for 800 people.

"We are expecting up to 4,000 visitors overall," says Toni Lauber.

Long tradition

Cow fights have a long tradition in Valais. As the name suggests, they are fought between Hérens cows and, unlike bullfights, usually end without injuries. The fights are part of the breed's natural behavior.

The EVZG Nikolaital has the patronage of the competition

to determine the lead cow in a herd.

The competitions are conducted by a fivemember jury: the preliminary rounds begin at 9:30 a.m., and the finals at approximately 3:00 p.m. Delegates bring the cows together for the competitions and prevent fighting cows from being disturbed by other cows . A five-member jury is responsible for the elimination process, in accordance with the applicable guidelines (see box)

Don't miss the spectacle

Advance ticket sales (CHF 20) are already underway. Proceeds from the "Reine du Cervin" event will benefit Zermatt's Alpine cooperatives for the sustainable maintenance of their infrastructure. In addition to the sporting highlights, the event will also feature an attractive supporting program with music and food stands. A shuttle bus will run between Zermatt train station and Zen Stecken to ensure easy access to the festival grounds.
