Anything but self-evident

If someone thinks that something very small can't have a big impact, then this statement has been put into perspective by the events surrounding the tiny virus "COVID-19." The virus didn't stop at schools and classrooms either.

It's not yet possible to say exactly how the situation at school will develop . During this difficult time, students, parents, and teachers have worked together with the help of distance learning to review and deepen their knowledge and maintain contact between the children using digital media . For this, everyone deserves a huge thank you!

Personal skills

School suddenly took place at home. Depending on their age, parents, schoolchildren, and teenagers now had to organize and plan their school days themselves. Despite the temptation to "sleep in," the balance between learning and free time, as well as a structured daily routine, were important so that the solutions, recordings, and videos of completed tasks could be submitted to the teacher in a timely manner . The children presented their results to the teacher via video, answered questions independently, and explained threimsubutlems, letters to parents, the children's learning tasks and offers of Endurance, perseverance, personal responsibility, willingness to perform and learn, etc., may seem inconspicuous, but they are important personal skills that suddenly could only be fostered at home.

Digital skills

Although teaching materials were delivered to some classes by mail, digital media gained importance. Classes were held via video conference, readings were given via FaceTime, results were shared via text messages, work was retrieved from the blog or Padlet, and students practiced and reinforced their knowledge using a variety of learning apps. Platforms were set up on the school's websiter from balcony to balcony, maintaining the necessary social Teaching became more digital, but also had its pitfalls. Teachers , parents, and children had to more or less find their way in the digital learning environment. Everyone's technical skills were in demand, but also revealed gaps in equipment and technology. On a smaller scale, it became clear that not everything is always as simple as it seems. Digitalization in teaching and the continuing education of teachers and children continue to be an important part of school development.

Social skills

The period of distance learning made it clear that the little things that are so selfevident in everyday school life matter. This includes personal relationships with subject teachers, special education teachers, and teachers of specialized learning. The focus is on the daily encounters between students and their friends, colleagues, and classmates. These were sorely missed.

When accompanying the children during distance learning, it became clear what challenges the parents faced, as the opportunities in many families were different.

For example, the computer absolutely necessary for completing the learning tasks was not available and the network capacity was too low; if the parents did not have the time to care for and accompany their children because they themselves were employed or did not feel able to support the children with school work; or if additional support overwhelmed those who did not speak German as their first language

Teachers were challenged to design and manage the demanding and diverse communication accordingly , while simultaneously mitigating the threat of increased inequality. Communication took place via mail, video chat or conference, phone calls, blogging, and, for example, math sessions with the children via FaceTime or storytelling via video.

The assignments were delivered by bicycle courier to the mailbox by the teacher, or simply delivered as learning tips, over the garden distance. A lot of good has happened in small ways. The coronavirus pandemic has provided impetus for children to be well supported – both analog and digital – regardless of their background, resources, and circumstances.

The start of the new school year is just around the corner. The special situation surrounding the SARS-CoV-2 virus continues to challenge us - our flexibility will be crucial

have their impressions from the "Corona period" written down.

"I find it a negative that we don't have as much help as we did at school. I do try to complete all the assignments on my own, though, and I usually manage to complete them. I'm quick at completing the assignments, so my stamina is good , and my motivation is really good. I try to stay motivated most of the time."

"I express my deep respect to all the teachers, because they make a lot of effort and always cheer us up. They are still there for us and support us in

Uncertainties.»

"I get up every morning at 8:00 a.m. and start school at 9:00 a.m. at the latest. I then work until 12:00 p.m. so I have the afternoon off."

"The coronavirus pandemic has been a very difficult time for me and my family. At first, it was complicated to completely change my school routine. I noticed that I 'd become a bit more independent, but I was mostly very unmotivated because I missed my teacher and my classmates. At first, I thought the concept of being homeschooled was very cool, as I'd always wanted to have this experience."

"The coronavirus pandemic is a very difficult time for me and my family! It was very complicated at first, but then I got used to it. Together we stay home, with each other, for each other, and stay healthy."

"I think it also takes getting used to the fact that you can't really look forward to anything, except that it will all be over soon. It's also difficult to set goals, which was always very easy for me. Since I'm taking piano lessons, that's also a change. I'm now always contacted via video call at a specific time. Then I have to point the camera at my fingers so that my piano teacher can assess my fingering. Otherwise, I always send my piano teacher videos of my progress and

She then sends me back videos with criticisms. A shocking fact is that since the lockdown, Zermatt has had bad weather on a single day."

"I learned a lot about independence, as well as the personal responsibility to solve the teacher's tasks quickly and independently. As I already mentioned, I learned a lot about independence. Through this new situation, I learned that you always have to be diligent, even if the teacher can't control everything."

Project «Partner School Pedagogical University» will continue

Last school year, the "Partner School" project was

successfully implemented in collaboration with the Valais

University of Teacher
Education. The third year of
study at the Valais University of
Teacher Education underwent a

structural change: study and practice were even more closely linked.

At Zermatt Primary School, two trainee teachers each taught three classes. This helped to alleviate the teacher shortage somewhat. The concept will be continued in Zermatt in the 2020/2021 school year with one class (7HB). In addition, eight new students from the Täsch/Randa school region will attend the 6th grade (8HA and 8HB) in Zermatt.

Valuable experiences

The teacher tandems Sandrine Heynen/
Samira Bertholjotti, Svenja Theler/Layla Imseng,
and Gaëlle Sinnaeve/Mathilde Fournier taught a
school class as a duo last school year, continued
their studies at the PH-VS, wrote their diploma
theses, and successfully completed their final
exams. A demanding workload, yet the six newly
qualified teachers draw a positive conclusion: The
support from the practical and classroom teachers
as well as the school administration, the integration
into the school team, and the daily experiences in
everyday school life were very valuable and lasting.
The program, with its four- to six-week internships,
is viewed by the students more as a "laboratory
situation."

Although they learn and study, the students cannot really apply

They only do this when they are responsible for their own class a year later.

The goal of the "Partner School" project was to provide a "live" entry into professional life through careful support and advice, as well as through studies that were even more closely aligned with everyday school life: lesson preparation, parent-teacher meetings, team discussions, classroom management, joint planning, team teaching, exams, marking, etc., all had to be responsibly prepared and carried out. These valuable experiences are not possible in a lecture hall.

The project will continue

In the coming school year, eleven classes in Upper Valais will be taught in tandem by trainee teachers.

The shortage of teachers has prompted the authorities at the Department of Education and the

Schoolchildren from

the Täsch/Randa school region

In the Täsch/Randa school region, despite great efforts, the vacant teaching positions for the coming school year 2020/2021 could not be fully filled, neither with teachers nor with students from the PH-VS. This specifically concerns the

School class 8H of the Täsch/Randa school region with a total of 17 students.

The primary school administration has been looking for suitable solutions.

In discussions with the school principals of the municipalities of Zermatt, Täsch, and Randa, and in consultation with the Department of Education, a one-year, pedagogically and organizationally sensible solution was found for the school region: In autumn 2020, eight students from the Täsch/Randa school region will attend classes in 8HA and 8HB in Zermatt. The remaining nine schoolchildren

They will be assigned to 7H in Randa, which operates a mixed-age class (7H/8H). This solution allows the 3H–6H classes in the school district to continue to be taught at the same age, ensuring continuity and peace of mind.

Homework? - Homework!

Homework is an integral part of everyday school life and has a long tradition.

The sense and nonsense of homework has been debated and discussed not only since the introduction of the Curriculum 21.

Modern work models, family structures, leisure activities, digitalization, and the experiences of parents, teachers, schoolchildren, and young people during the distance learning era are bringing this topic into even sharper focus. Does homework still belong in the classroom, and if so, how should it be designed in a pedagogically meaningful way?

What does research say?

Research presents a contradictory picture: On the one hand, learning effectiveness is rated as low and equal opportunities are viewed critically; on the other hand, Hattie's meta-study shows that "conscious practice," "concentration, perseverance, and commitment" have a strong effect. Experts agree that homework leads to learning progress when it is carried out carefully, regularly, and in a planned manner. Occasional assignments have no effect; they are not effective for learning. What matters is the quality of the assignments and careful planning!

Legal basis

Homework is enshrined in law in the Canton of Valais and is also part of the Canton of Valais' Curriculum 21. The Ordinance on the Primary School Law and the Ordinance on Assessment state:

- "The goal of homework is to consolidate the knowledge and skills acquired
- \cdot "Homework must be appropriate to the school level and the subjects

In Curriculum 21, the focus of homework is on personal competencies:

· Students can complete homework independently and prepare for assessments.

The following time limits apply: 10 minutes

per class per day starting in 3H. Students in 3H should therefore spend no more than 10 minutes per day on homework (including exam preparation). Students in 8H should spend no more than 60 minutes per day on homework, and students in 11H ${\it should spend no more than 90 minutes per day on homework (including exam preparation)}.} The \ teachers \ support \ the \ children \ and \ young \ people \ by:$

- · Agreements within the class team and among the subject teachers are important to ensure that the maximum homework time is not exceeded or accumulates before the end of the semester
- · No homework may be assigned from Friday to Monday, on public holidays or during the school holidays.

Role of the students

Young children usually look forward to homework when they start school; they want to be able to show at home what they have learned. Depending on their age and development, students can:

 increasingly take responsibility for homework themselves take

- · Determine and set up the workplace
- · Set working hours, go offline and concentrate
- · Divide and plan tasks over different days
- · It is better to study four times for 20 minutes than for an entire evening

Homework is a window into the school system. Parents gain insight into their children's daily school life and notice what's going on at school, whether the child is making progress in reading, knows their multiplication tables, has learned English vocabulary, etc. However, homework often becomes a burden for the family, or there's no room for it in the daily schedule. This can be due to different work schedules, too many leisure activities, or a lack of language skills, etc. This can make completing homework difficult.

Depending on their personality and age, children and adolescents need a clear framework (e.g., fixed times, offline time, supervision) and a workspace where they can work undisturbed. Leisure activities and bedtimes must also be coordinated with the child.

be planned and implemented together.

As parents, you can support your child with their homework,

- · if you help the child as soon as he or she asks for help
- \cdot when you encourage the child to finish their homework
- \cdot if you are interested in the child's work and appreciate
- · when you check the work, ask questions and
- · when you practice with the children (e.g. reading aloud).

In discussions with the teacher, uncertainties and ambiguities can be clarified.

Role of teachers

Children and adolescents are often overwhelmed by their homework, both in terms of time and content, and organizational skills. As a result, assignments are often neglected or left unfinished. These students are then quickly labeled

- · show how to learn «learning to learn»
- · provide differentiated tasks tailored to the children
- · Discuss and plan work with students (daily and weekly plans, homework schedule, learning diary, exam preparation, etc.)
- · write down the homework with the children
- · Get feedback from the children and discuss the work with them
- · Carefully plan homework in the team and among the subject teachers
- · Advise parents, schoolchildren and young people

PET collection

A large amount of foreign matter is still being disposed of in the PET beverage bottle collection system, which severely hampers the recycling process. Therefore, we are turning to you to provide assistance with the collection of PET beverage bottles.

Private individuals

Empty PET beverage bottles can be

In principle, beverage bottles can be returned to any location where they were purchased (including Migros, Coop, Denner). It is also possible to drop off these beverage bottles free of charge at the "mobile brings" service, at the locations and times published in the waste calendar.

Catering/service businesses

The catering and service companies can return their collected PET beverage bottles to the beverage suppliers or to the

Dispose of directly in the trough provided by Spiss.

The 110-liter bags required for this can, as before, be purchased directly from the beverage supplier or from Schwendimann AG.

Flood protection Triftbach – lowering the water level at the upper Triftsee

Preventive flood protection is given very high priority in Zermatt. Various measures are being taken to ensure this.

A key aspect is regular inspections of the waterways by experts, who identify potential hazards from wood, landslides, rock or ice collapses, etc., and initiate appropriate measures. Continuous monitoring also contributes to safety, as it allows for the detection of irregularities and the early warning of potential threats. Active communication with power plant operators also provides helpful information about any changes in the waterways.

To minimize the risk of a flood, a decision was made, in consultation with the cantonal authorities, to lower the lake's water level in a controlled manner by several meters. For this purpose, an excavator was transported to the area in several parts by helicopter on July 14, 2020, and assembled on site. Work to lower the water level began the following day.


Following a report from the Grande Dixence about increased water discharge in the Triftbach stream near the Vieliboden catchment, the experts called in at the end of June 2020 investigated the cause. The late onset of snowmelt led to increased water flow at the catchment. At the same time, it was determined that the ice masses along the southern edge of the Gabelhorn Glacier near the upper Triftsee lake had receded significantly and were no longer supported on the valley side. Ice fragments from smaller icefalls have already reached the upper Triftsee lake. In the case of larger icefalls, the triggering of a flood wave in the lake and its discharge into the Triftbach stream could not be ruled out.

By lowering the lake level, the volume of water affected by a breakaway ice and thus the magnitude of any flood wave was reduced. The newly created outlet was designed to dampen any flood wave and prevent widespread overflow of the lake's outlet area.

In the meantime, the work has been completed and the danger of ice breaking off into the upper Triftsee has been eliminated.

The flood wave released in the Triftbach was significantly reduced.



Publication of owner data in Valgis

Generally

The official web-based geographic information system (WebGIS) of the municipality of Zermatt is hosted on the Valgis platform, which is managed by the local company PLANAX AG (formerly Aufdenblatten Geomatik AG). Various geographical data such as official surveys, approved zoning plans, hazard maps, addresses, national maps, aerial photographs, etc., are thus accessible to the public .

As of August 7, 2020, property ownership data will be publicly available in Valgis. According to Article 970, Paragraph 2, Section 2 of the Swiss Civil Code, any person is entitled to receive information about the name and identification of the owner without having to demonstrate a credible interest. Publishing the ownership data in Valgis automates and simplifies this information provision process. Furthermore, comprehensive queries (e.g., all properties owned by a person) are not possible.





I called for and arranged for the last general meeting on June 25, 2020. I called for it so that information about the agreement regarding accessibility to Zermatt could finally be provided.

Concerned about the difficult circumstances and restrictions related to the current COVID-19 situation.

We're used to the fact that the number of participants at the primary meetings for the presentation of the budget and financial statements is rather modest. This is surprising, however, when you consider the amount of financial expenditure and the public's responsibility.

However, on June 25, 2020, I would have seen far more than 130 people. Wait! Where were the petitioners? 584 valid signatures supported the IG's petition, and almost every resident of Zermatt had their own opinion about the accessibility of our village.

The municipal council was prepared to hold this important meeting in two gymnasiums combined with a video conference. Furthermore, all necessary safety measures were meticulously prepared and implemented. The meeting concluded with an aperitif afterward, providing a perfect opportunity for the always valuable discussions and encounters.

The low attendance at the primary assemblies means that Zermatt may have to consider introducing a general council instead of the primary assembly. According to municipal law, this council consists of 45 members who then represent the interests of the population.

Households and many hotels have taken advantage of this very attractive offer, and word is spreading that the savings effect is being achieved and the comfort is still high

As with any new technology—and especially energysaving technology— many people are initially skeptical and have questions. The funding program runs throughout Switzerland, and we've summarized the most frequently asked questions and answers here:

Does the shower head still produce enough water for a normal shower?

Yes, in blind tests – even in hotels – those taking showers didn't notice any water savings.

This is due to the sophisticated technical saving function. This draws in air and enriches the water jet. This results in a full, soft, and comfortable spray.

Can the shower head be mounted on any shower hose?

Yes, all standard shower hoses have a ½-inch connector, as do the shower heads. Therefore, they fit any shower hose.

Does the shampoo wash out easily and quickly on long hair?

Yes, you won't notice any difference. It's important not to use too much shampoo when washing your hair. With the right amount, the lather can be quickly rinsed out with less water. As soon as a lot of lather develops, you've already overdosed.



Why should we save water in Switzerland? We have enough water here.

Heating water requires a great deal of energy. The funding project is all about saving this energy. The fact that water and wastewater are also saved is a welcome side effect. It will demonstrably reduce greenhouse gas emissions and thus actively contribute to sustainable climate protection.

Why is only one soda subsidized per household in Switzerland?

This is decided by Klik, the funding agency. It defines a fixed subsidy in Swiss francs per household. If multiple showers per household were subsidized, the amount per shower would be reduced.

Why do you get the shower after the Order not delivered promptly?

The available funding must be used as efficiently as possible to achieve maximum

of households. This will be achieved through efficient distribution, including bundled shipping and B-Post.

Promotion runs until the

end of September 2020

Within the framework of the subsidy program, a maximum of one energy-saving shower head can be purchased at the promotional price per household and per room in hotels . All households and hotels that have not yet ordered a shower head with energy-saving function at the promotional price of CHF 10 instead of CHF 37 (or CHF 24 for non-fossil hot water preparation) can still do so.

Zermatt Civic Community – Annual Financial Statements

Restructuring successfully completed

The content of the 2019 annual financial statements differs significantly from those of previous years. In June 2018, the Annual General Meeting laid the foundations for a modern and future-oriented restructuring. Firstly, it approved the merger of the Matterhorn Group with Matterhorn Group Management AG to form Matterhorn Group AG, and secondly, it approved the leasing of the hotels and restaurants to Matterhorn Group AG.

Accordingly, the real estate holdings will remain with the Zermatt Civic Community, while the operation of the hotels and restaurants will be outsourced to the Matterhorn Group AG, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Zermatt Civic Community. Due to weather-dependent fluctuations in income, the Civic Assembly of December 13, 2018, also decided to dissolve the Hörnlihütte Zermatt Foundation and transfer the Hörnlihütte, including its assets and liabilities, back to the Civic Community.

Balance shee

The balance sheet total increased by CHF 2,060,000 to CHF 104,620,000. In addition to the investments made, the retransfer of the Hörnli Hut to the community was the primary reason for this increase in balance sheet assets. The same applies to

Long-term liabilities. As a result of the assumption of the Hörnlihütte Zermatt Foundation's financial liabilities by the Civic Community , liabilities increased by CHF 3,778,000 to CHF 74.4 million in the reporting year.

The equity ratio remains almost unchanged year-on-year (-0.3%) at 23.8%. This is an appropriate equity ratio, especially given that the municipality's balance sheet includes considerable hidden reserves (e.g., the stake in Zermatt Bergbahnen AG).

Investments

As a result of the restructuring, the balance sheet includes, in addition to the contributions in kind, in particular the Burgergemeinde's investments in stock corporations.

The former collective company Hotel Restaurant In November 2019, Schwarzsee was able to invest in a share The Burgergemeinde holds a majority stake of 53.1% in this new stock corporation.

Since the business activities of Shogun Gastro AG did not develop as expected, this investment was written down from TCHF 100 to zero in the reporting year.

In addition, the community has donated CHF 50,000 10% shares in the new Matterhorn Pellet AG were subscribed.

This investment will enable wood waste from the Burger forests to be processed into wood pellets in the future.

Net, the participation rights of the community increase by TCHF 1,018 to TCHF 10,827.

Income statement

As a result of the restructuring, the Burgergemeinde's income consists primarily of rental income amounting to TCHF 6,098.

This rental income includes the rent that Matterhorn Group AG pays to the community for the use of the hotels and restaurants.

Income from building rights, at CHF 662,000, was CHF 312,000 higher than the previous year. This is due to a contractually agreed higher building rights interest compensation from Zermatt Bergbahnen AG , which could be retroactively offset for the last two years . Together with the financial income, the municipality generated total revenue of CHF 7,870,000.

As the owner of the tangible assets, the expenses associated with the real estate remain with the municipality. These include, in particular, the costs of property insurance, interest on borrowed capital (CHF 1,445,000), and taxes (CHF 229,000). The municipality also bears the depreciation of the fixed assets, amounting to CHF 5,267,000.

The community closed the financial year with a balanced result (+TCHF 98).

Zermatt in the best company

What is the relationship between a former St. Moritz spa director and Zermatt? In my case, it's very close and sentimental. Forty years ago, together with my then Zermatt colleague Constant Cachin, I proposed to the directors of the BVZ, FO, and RhB railway companies the relaunch of the Glacier Express , which operated between Zermatt and St. Moritz in the summer between 1930 and 1975. Since the opening of the Furka Tunnel in June 1982, the "slowest express train in the world" has delighted a good 8 million passengers and today brings around 40% of summer visitors to the Matter Valley and the Upper Engadine, as well

as several tens of thousands in winter

In February, Annemarie Meyer, CEO of Glacier Express AG, reported excellent figures for 2019: 258,000 passengers, 10% more than the previous year. The new Excellence Class was also already well-used, even earning the Glacier Express a Milestone Award. This sets the stage for its anniversary year in 2020. The world's most famous mountain railway will celebrate its 90th anniversary with a special media tour on August 11-12.


I recently recommended my favorite option with the "Glacier" to people in southeastern Switzerland as follows: "There's a full moon on October 1, 2020. The panoramic trip, including the UNESCO World Heritage Site and the Ruinaulta Gorge, offers eight hours of the finest autumn colors at this time of year. For an overnight stay in Zermatt, I recommend the Hotel Kulm, a good 3,000 meters above sea level on the Gornergrat, with 24-hour views of the Matterhorn (and on October 1, the full moon as well) and about 30 other 4,000-meter peaks in the surrounding area: unique and at the same price as the rest of the year. Have a great trip!"

The following consideration demonstrates the potential that still lies in the climate-friendly "Glacier": On December 11, 2019, UNESCO added mountaineering to the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.

Switzerland (SAC and the Mountain Guides Association) has applied for this jointly, along with Italy and France. How can this be exploited for tourism? For example, by combining well-known alpine centers with panoramic public transport routes and the globally known and recognized UNESCO label. For example: The Glacier Express connects Zermatt–Matterhorn with Pontresina/Bernina daily, passing through the UNESCO World Heritage sites of the Aletsch Glacier, Sardona, and RhB/Albula.

RhB and PostBus also provide daily connections to the Swiss National Park, South Tyrol, and the Dolomites, with two other UNESCO World Heritage sites, including Reinhold Messner's five MMM mountain and castle museums. In tourism terms, we call this type of vacation "touring." It has been growing at double-digit rates for years, year-round, worldwide

Update road renewal Gornergrat Railway

The road renewal work between Zermatt and Findelbach, which began last year on the Gornergrat Railway (GGB), is now

to a conclusion this fall.

On the Zermatt–Findelbach section, the new track still needs to be welded and neutralized. The welding work will take place during night shifts during the week:

- Week 40, 2020 from Sun, Sept. 27, Mon, Sept. 28 to Thu, Oct. 1, Fri, Oct. 2
 Time approx. 8 pm to 5 am
- Week 41, 2020 from Sun, Oct 4, Mon, Oct 5 to Thu, Oct 8, Fri, Oct 9
 Time approx. 8 pm to 5 am

A construction train must be used for the work. The welding and neutralization work will cause minimal noise emissions.




Due to structural defects, the La Maya culvert must be replaced. Due to the coronavirus shutdown, the roadway renewal was brought forward to spring and completed, with the exception of some minor finishing work.

The La Maya replacement culvert (GGB overpass over Riedstrasse) is now scheduled for fall 2020. Preparatory work will be carried out in September and October. The preparatory work will include, among other things, prefabricating the abutments for the culvert and the bridge deck at an on-site installation site. Work will be carried out in day shifts. The noise intensity of the preparatory work will be consistent with normal construction site noise. Several exploratory trenches are required to precisely identify the existing utility lines under Riedstrasse at the culvert. This will result in short-term traffic disruptions on Riedstrasse.

From November 2, 2020 (6:00 a.m.) to November 6, 2020 (11:00 p.m.), the culvert will be replaced during a total closure of the GGB. The work will be carried out in shifts from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. During this time, Riedstrasse will also be closed and will remain accessible only for emergencies (fire department/ambulance). During the demolition work and the repair of the track system, higher noise levels are unavoidable. However, between 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., only minor work on the overhead line is planned during this construction phase, which will not cause any noise pollution.

Starting November 9, 2020, minor finishing work, including the dismantling of construction site equipment, the repair of the installation areas, and the paving work at the culvert, still need to be completed. If winter arrives early, these activities may have to be suspended and postponed until spring 2021. Depending on the progress of construction, the final paving work at the culvert may not be completed until spring 2021.



Zermatt Farmers' Guild – Once a burger, forever a burger



Addendum to the statutes of the Farmers' Guild of 27 December 1635

In the 13th and 14th centuries, residents in many places in Valais began to strive for independence. Initially, the primary goal was economic independence. Alpine, forest, common land, and water sharing communities emerged. These cooperative communities in Valais were fostered not by legal constraints, but by natural necessity.

Home and right of use

In the tough struggle for daily bread, under the constant threat of the forces of nature, and in the protracted battles for independence, the sense of community and thus the economic system were strengthened. These communities were emergency communities and real associations. Their goal was the execution, supervision, and maintenance of common works. They were economic entities, but they lacked independent sovereign functions . The economic community formed a legal entity that, in both content and form, exercised functions under private law. Only later did these economic associations develop into the political community - the farmers' guild, the burgher community. Many communities were absorbed into the political community, while others continued to exist as economic associations parallel to the political community for centuries. Community guilds, for example, have continued to exist to the present day. These cooperative structures and their statutes are called "farmers' guilds" or

Some of these economic mergers gave rise to

Later, the municipality, with a much broader and more comprehensive scope of duties and activities, including political and police regulations, encompassed a specific area such as Balfrinstrasse 15 A, 3930 Visp, Tel. 027 945 13 44

The political community was a protective and defensive association, internally for order among the communities, externally for protection Farmers' guilds were often called political communities. The term "communitas'

or "birth guilds." Were these farmers' guilds actually communities or

municipalities? From the contents of a "farmers' guild," it is generally easy to determine whether it is a privately owned community or a public-law community.

Citizens' community

The community's farmers' guild statutes not only contain provisions

regarding alpine pastures, forests, and common lands, but also regulate, in their very first articles, the acquisition and loss of citizenship, address the political rights and duties of citizens, and also contain provisions regarding roads and police regulations. The farmers' guild, as a village and as a village statute, was the citizen community. Citizenship was of crucial importance at a time when income and livelihood depended on agriculture, alpine pastures, and livestock farming, because only citizenship granted citizens a permanent home and the right to use the alpine pastures and forests.

He could not be expelled from the village like a Hintersäss (non-citizen).

Glacier Ride II construction
projects on time.

Work between Tuftern and Rothorn began on schedule in the spring. The overall project is divided into three different subprojects. First, the 10- passenger Kumme gondola lift is being built; at the same time, the associated Col-Tuftern snowmaking system is being expanded; and finally, new avalanche masts are being installed to secure the lift and slopes.

The old Kumme lift's mountain station was demolished in the spring, with the demolition material being recycled as concrete. The technical installations and timber from the old Kumme lift will be

melifts have been properly disposed of and the construction of the three new stations is in full swing.

The new stations will be located in an ecologically sensitive area. To ensure that the construction work is carried out in harmony with nature, environmental construction monitoring will regularly monitor that all requirements are strictly adhered to

The construction work at the valley station, middle station, and mountain station can be completed by mid-August, so that the installation of the cable car technology can begin immediately afterwards.

Meanwhile, cable car manufacturer Garaventa has completed the preparatory work for the installation of the supports. The civil engineering work for the support foundations has also been largely completed, and these are ready for the installation of the supports.

The next major step will take place at the beginning of August. A heavy-lift helicopter will transport the supports, the support heads, the roller batteries and the first electromechanical components

the middle station and the control room were flown in and assembled.

Towards the end of August, the remaining supports, the rest of the middle station and the escalators at the valley station will follow.

The next step will be the cable pulling in September. The two cables will be transported by truck through Zermatt via Riedweg to the valley station, from where they will finally be pulled into place.

Once the cables and electromechanics of the stations have been fully installed, the timber construction company will enclose the valley and mountain stations so that the stations and the entire facility can be opened on schedule for the coming winter season.

The stations of the Matterhorn glacier ride II are taking

Work on the highest Alpine crossing by cable car has been underway since early summer 2019. After the excavation and securing work was completed last summer, construction work is currently progressing. Especially at

The limited space available during construction of the mountain station presents a major challenge. Contrary to the normal construction process, the station must be built from top to bottom.

In addition to final rock stabilization, the control room, the first part of the rear upright and several retaining walls were already built during this construction summer.

Currently, up to five different teams are in operation. Coordinating the teams, which are working on different stages and sharing the confined construction site, is a major challenge.

As with the construction of the Matterhorn Glacier Ride, weather is a key factor this time as well. Work is repeatedly disrupted by wind and snow.

In the valley station, the more than 20-meter-deep excavation was completed with a The entire excavation pit had to be secured with shotcrete and 16-meter-long rock nails. Currently, the pipelines are being laid beneath the future foundation. The extremely large valley station requires over 100 meters of cable protection pipes. Additional rock anchors must be installed for the front support.

Construction work on the basement level has been progressing since June. Once the foundation slab is concreted, the pace of work can be increased, and the station will begin to take shape at an ever-increasing pace.

The materials from both stations are transported to the construction sites by cable car from the intermediate depot at Laghi Cime Bianche. Since the materials from both stations must be transported via cable car in this project, the challenge is considerably greater than the construction of the first tricable gondola. To be able to serve both construction sites simultaneously, the transport must be meticulously planned.

According to the construction program, the civil engineering work at at least one of the two stations should be completed by fall 2020 , so that Leitner can begin installing the railway technology in the winter. Depending on the construction progress , a decision will be made in the fall as to which station the railway technology components will be installed first. Delivery of all electromechanical components and the wooden structure to Laghi Cime Bianche will take place by the end of October.

ZBAG's stated goal is to open the Matterhorn Glacier Ride II and thus also the AlpineX Alpine crossing during the 2021/2022 winter season . They are currently well on their way to achieving this goal, and if the weather and external conditions cooperate , the first guests will soon be able to cross the Alps by cable car — with the Matterhorn always in sight.
