
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Construction work

How is the salt spread?

The Technical Service has several vehicles equipped with salt spreaders. The amount can be adjusted very precisely. The spreading rate can be adjusted between 0 and 60 g per and 5.5 meters.

However, the vehicles are sometimes reaching their limits in Zermatt. They operate only with allwheel drive, without spikes, and the weight of the load causes the vehicles to easily slide. The

The water quality of rivers is constantly monitored throughout Switzerland, even more frequently during the winter months. The measurements confirm that the quantities of salt discharged into public

Increased consultations have also been held with the Cantonal Department of the Environment, Water Protection Section, regarding the disposal of snow in streams. The issued guidelines regarding snow disposal in streams are being adhered to.

In this issue we will look at the process of

Snow removal and the most important tool in snow removal – road salt. How is it used, and does salt harm flora and fauna?

It's snowing – what now?

As soon as it snows in the evening and/or at night, the day begins very early for the technical service employees. They meet at 4:00 a.m. in the workshop at Spiss.

Snow clearing is carried out in various rounds. There are nine mechanical and five manual rounds. The goal is to clear the streets and paths of snow as quickly as possible before passenger and electric traffic increases.

Equipped with plows, snow cutters, and snow shovels, the various teams, consisting of twelve operators, begin clearing snow directly from the spit. Plowing the streets takes about three to four hours (up to a maximum snow depth of 30 cm and with little to no traffic). The time required to remove the snow

The total time is approximately six to eight hours. In periods of increased traffic, plowing can take an additional two to three hours, and removal can take as much as three to four hours. The approximately 20-person "foot crew" starts at the Metro building and takes care of all stairs and sidewalks that cannot be cleared of snow by machines.

The clearing of illegal traffic jams involves the use of salt. No other deicing agent can compete with salt.

Road salt is a natural product: a 99.5% fine-grained sodium chloride. The positively charged sodium and negatively charged chlorine ions attach to the water molecules of the top layer of ice and dissolve

The water molecules are continuously released. The ice thaws. The technical service relies on preventive salting, like most winter maintenance companies. Salting usually takes place shortly before snowfall. The roads must be wet for the salt to adhere. This prevents

The snow settles on the road, is compacted by traffic, and freezes into a thick layer of ice. When it starts to snow, it can become a race against time. The deeper the layer of snow becomes, the less effective the salt is. After the salt has been spread, the amount of precipitation is waited for. If larger amounts are expected, the snow is plowed back to the side of the road and removed after the snow has reached a depth of about 10 cm.

The effect of the salt wears off after three to four hours. After that, it's too diluted. Therefore, it's important to reapply salt after snow removal to melt any ice that may have formed, prevent ice formation, or dry the road more quickly, as described in the last issue.

There's no "recipe" for winter road maintenance, nor are there precise quidelines. Much depends on experience. Weather, weather forecasts, wind speed and direction, air

De-icing agent than the natural product salt.

Humidity, air pressure, solar radiation, the orientation of roads, and much more influence the use of salt. Every application is different.

Less is more

Even small amounts of salt are sufficient to melt snow and ice. Typically, 6 to 12 grams of salt per square meter are spread mechanically in Zermatt. This corresponds to a heaped teaspoon. Private individuals, by comparison, use around 100 to 200 grams of salt per square meter on their properties.

By removing the snow plowed to the side, an additional 30 to 40% of salt can be saved compared to other destinations . If the snow is simply $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right) \left$ pushed to the side, much more meltwater flows over the roads during the day, washing away the existing salt. Therefore, salt must be spread repeatedly to prevent ice from freezing.

Concerns are repeatedly raised about the impact of salt use on the

This risk is known, but the population can rest assured. A large portion of the salt spread is carried into the sewage system by the meltwater. Trees, plants, and the soil are hardly damaged due to the current system (direct removal of the snow), as the localized salt load is minimal. Unlike snow blown to the side, which has a higher salt concentration and is transported by the meltwater,

seeps into the soil. A multi-year study on avenue trees in Hanover has shown that chloride levels are subject to strong fluctuations over the course of a year and that the limit values are not exceeded either in the

Rather, other stress factors influence the trees and plants along the roadside, such as soil conditions, root constriction, water and nutrient deficiencies, and contamination from motor oil or dog feces and urine.



No. Salt is the most effective way to combat ice and ensure safe road conditions.

Wood chips and grit are not suitable for road maintenance. They have a negative impact on icing; comparatively, you need 20 to 30 times more grit than de-icing salt. Transport, storage, and disposal are costly, and wood chippings can also clog sewers. Thus, road salt performs best, but winter service always says, "...only as much as

«C'est le ton qui fait la musique»

During the 2022/23 winter season, three time slots for outdoor music playback, determined by the municipal council, will be tested as part of a pilot phase. A qualified specialist firm will be involved in assessing noise emissions in the village and the mountain area.

The new noise abatement regulations have been in force since April 2022. Although they fundamentally regulate all types of sound, experience in summer 2022 has shown that not all music is created equal and that music and noise are perceived subjectively.

In the interests of entrepreneurs and residents

Against this background, all operating permit holders were invited to participate in a survey on outdoor sound systems . The aim of this survey was to develop a sense and understanding of whether and in what way local businesses play music on

their terraces and at the same time find a solution in the interests of the residents .

After evaluating the survey, the municipal council was able to set three time slots for the test phase of the background music in winter 2022/23. Due to the staggered visitor and guest volume

Different time windows were set for mountain restaurants and for businesses in the village and a distinction is made between background music and foreground music. Applications for outdoor sprinkler systems in winter 2022/23 will be approved according to the specified time frames.

Time windows set by the municipal council for outdoor music in winter 2022/2023

11:00–20:00: for all establishments, background music*, at 20:00 music from 11:00–17:00: for mountain restaurants, foreground music**, at 17:00 music from 3:00 PM–7:00 PM: for businesses in the village, foreground music**, from 7:00 PM

- ** Entertaining, easy-to-listen music (e.g. après-ski music, live band, DJ set, piano, etc.)



Solution for those seeking peace and quiet and partygoers

The Zermatt-Matterhorn destination, with its wide range of offerings, attracts different types of guests to the foot of the Matterhorn.

This will affect the needs and expectations of guests regarding entertainment. With the help of a commissioned specialist firm, concrete specifications and implementation guidelines for outdoor sound systems will now be determined, enabling coexistence between those seeking peace and quiet, residents, and partygoers. The plan is to divide Zermatt and the surrounding areas into noise sensitivity zones, and in a second step, to formulate the measurement and calculation parameters, taking environmental protection law into account.

Too loud – what to do?


The first step is to seek constructive dialogue with those causing the noise. Experience has shown that more than half of complaints can be resolved this way – including through compromise.

If the discussion doesn't have any effect, it's recommended to contact the regional police so that noise levels and other important factors (such as location, wind direction, and music system) can be analyzed. Noise measurements are at the expense of the person causing the noise.

Subject to approval

Businesses wishing to have a one-time or fixed outdoor sound system must submit a written request to the municipal council **at least 14 days in advance**.


Without the approval of the local council, playing music outdoors is not permitted.

School without electricity





Imagine you have class and there is no electricity.

After the fall break, the children and young people experienced exactly this situation. It was deliberate, as the first "Energy School" event was being held in all schools in Zermatt. The goal was to learn how to get by without electricity, talk about energy, and address it in class.

What is an energy school

An energy school is a school that deals with the topic of energy in depth, regularly and holistically – both in class and within the framework of

of the entire school operation. "Energy" is discussed, experienced, and learned in all subjects in the context of Curriculum 21.

Powerless morning

In consultation with the caretaker team, IT managers, and school administration, the power was turned off in all school buildings at 7:00 a.m., creating a "mini power outage." The school buildings remained dark. Only the heating and emergency exits remained switched on. The first challenge was getting into the school building at all, as the automatic doors weren't working.

The kids and teenagers then entered their dark classroom (summer time!), but the interactive whiteboards and PCs were off, and a ghostly atmosphere prevailed in the hallways.

In class discussions, the students, depending on their level, discussed by candlelight what energy is in the physical sense, where electricity comes from, what it means when there is no energy flow, which devices in everyday life at home and at school are useless without electricity, how electricity could be saved, and which devices are "energy guzzlers." These topics are discussed

will now be further deepened over the course of the school year, be it with an "energy day" or with teaching units.

The children and young people experienced the restrictions firsthand, but daylight was getting stronger and lessons could continue. Mathematics and languages were learned only with textbooks

Chalk and writing utensils, notebooks, and paper were used again.

Textile and technical design classes required primarily manual labor,
as the various machines weren't working. The morning flew by , and
regular classes could resume in the afternoon. One student simply
asked: "Would it be possible to start the morning every Monday without

jurther projects are planned

The topic of "energy" is regularly on the curriculum. Among other things, schoolchildren visited the Grande Dixence facilities in Zmutt, discussed glacier retreat, and reflected on climate change. Energy days are held in the first half of the year, during which the topic is explored in more depth through experiments. A visit to the energy advisory service is scheduled, and an external expert will raise the children's awareness of energy consumption . In Cycle 1, for example, good and bad energy will be discussed as part of the classroom climate. The goal is for students , teachers, and school staff to reflect on their behavior in using energy.











Possible development of heat demand in Zermatt





Energy policy is a top priority in the municipality of Zermatt . The municipality has demonstrated its commitment to energy policy through several projects and activities and has been certified as an Energy City since 2016. This recognition by the federal government as a progressive municipality contributing to the implementation of the national energy and climate strategy. In 2018, the Energy City compiled a CO2 and energy balance sheet and derived an energy and climate strategy with concrete measures and goals from it. An energy and climate vision was also developed. This year, an energy spatial plan and a solar potential utilization analysis were conducted.

Benefits of energy spatial planning

With its municipal energy spatial planning, the municipality of Zermatt has developed an important planning basis for the future renewable and efficient energy supply within the municipality . The municipality's current and future energy needs, as well as the potential of locally available renewable energies, were analyzed . Based on this, recommendations for action were developed for the municipality and for private property owners.

Current energy sources for heat generation are predominantly fossil

The current energy demand of the municipality of Zermatt is largely covered by fossil fuels (around 60% from oil heating). Zermatt is a tourist destination, which is why around 90% of the CO2 emissions from the building stock are caused by hotels and apartment buildings . Electricity demand is already met by around 60%

from local renewable energies, mainly hydropower .

Drastic reduction in energy demand necessary

To forecast the future energy demand of the Zermatt municipality's building stock in 2035 and 2050, two scenarios were developed - the Reference Scenario and the Efficiency Scenario.

efficiency. The reference scenario is "business as usual." In this case, the energy demand of the municipality of Zermatt's building stock increases by 4.2% by 2050.

The efficiency scenario, however, shows that the energy demand of the municipality of Zermatt's building stock must be reduced by 22% by 2050 in order to meet the objectives of the national energy strategy.

Accelerate building renovation

To reduce building energy consumption according to targets, the number of building renovations per year must be accelerated. This requires an average of four times more buildings to be renovated annually (thermal insulation of roofs/facades, window replacement, etc.) than is currently the case, so that around 70% of the building stock is renovated by 2050. The municipality is therefore considering establishing a municipal energy subsidy program to further motivate homeowners to renovate their properties.

Available potential of renewable energies for heat production

To replace fossil fuels and inefficient direct electric heating systems for heat generation in Zermatt, various alternatives can be used. The use of geothermal energy and ambient air through heat pumps will be a priority. For optimal performance, geothermal probes should be regenerated in the summer, for example, by solar thermal energy. Solar thermal energy could also support hot water production, especially. Wood heating systems are also interesting at Zermatt's high altitude. However, the potential analysis has shown that the locally available quantities of wood are limited.

Possible areas for a district heating network identified

By spatially representing the heat demand, three areas with a high thermal density were identified in Zermatt.

te are identified that are suitable for a heat network

are suitable: the "North" area of the Spiss district, the "West" area around Bahnhofstrasse and the "East" area east of the Matter Vispa. The "West" area is considered a priority due to its higher CO2 emissions. Energy sources for these district heating networks could include waste heat from wastewater treatment plants, wood, geothermal probes, or possibly water from the Matter Vispa. The municipality will now conduct a detailed feasibility study for the construction of a district heating network in

Expand renewable and local electricity production

There is great potential for electricity production through the use of hydropower with the Gornerli project.

Furthermore, according to the federal government's Wind Atlas, several areas in Zermatt have been designated as "areas with a balancing of interests in the national interest" for wind power use. Due to the current conditions in Switzerland, wind power projects face numerous obstacles. Solar energy, in particular, offers significant and easily exploitable potential. The sun is one of the most important energy sources, and the solar potential in the mountains is significantly higher than in the Swiss Plateau.

Solar potential of the municipality of Zermatt

The solar power potential in the municipality of Zermatt for all existing roofs and facades is

Annual yield of approximately 74 GWh, with the majority of solar power being produced during the summer months. According to regional energy planning, Zermatt's electricity demand in 2019 was a total of 104 GWh. The majority of this was needed in the winter.

The calculated solar radiation map shows for the Zermatt location average annual values in the area from 1700 to 2000 kWh/m2 . In comparison, the average solar radiation in Switzerland is around 1100 kWh/m2 .

Solar production in winter

To investigate the potential taking into account local conditions (e.g. increased snow amounts and snow-covered PV systems), the irradiation values were divided into two time periods: November to February as snowy months and March to October as snow-free months.

Phase. The irradiation map from November to February shows an average irradiation of around 250 kWh/m2 .

During the snow-free period, an average of 1650 kWh/m2 is expected. This means that only around 13% of the total energy is lost during a relatively long four-month period of snow cover. Furthermore, higher yields are achieved during the snow-free months than the year-round Swiss average. This solar potential can therefore also be economically exploited in snowy regions such as Zermatt . The increased stresses caused by snow loads must be considered when selecting modules.

When using a facade system, a consistent electricity yield is achieved throughout the year. Seasonal fluctuations are thus reduced. The potential and economic viability

must be considered individually for each building, as facade systems are heavily dependent on neighboring buildings and their shadows.

Combining solar potential and architecture

By simplifying the registration process for solar systems, instead of a building permit procedure, the interest in using solar energy is given greater weight than design requirements.

In order to cleverly combine solar potential with architecture , the goal is to consider both aspects—architectural values and solar potential—in parallel when planning a solar system . Overlaying solar potential with architectural, urban planning , and heritage conservation values defines how suitable an area, the so-called perimeter, is for the installation of the solar system. Areas with high solar potential

Areas with virtually no listed heritage value are particularly suitable and will be particularly encouraged in future planning for solar systems. The Spiss district plan, for example, is a very suitable area type, as this area is undergoing significant transformation and has virtually no listed heritage value. Furthermore, new buildings and existing buildings without protected status, as well as public buildings and infrastructure structures, are particularly suitable for the use of solar

Roof desig

Solar panels on roofs in building and agricultural zones are subject to legal notification, provided they are sufficiently adapted. In mountain villages, particular attention must be paid to roof design. Roofs are visible from various perspectives year-round— when hiking in summer, and skiing in winter.

The mountain villages in the Alps are characterized by the long tradition of stone roofs, which is still used today.

The roof is to be designed as a fifth facade in the planning Legal regulations stipulate continuous, compact areas for solar systems, as well as limited roof overhangs and a ban on roof overhangs. To maintain a peaceful roofscape, adjustments in color and format are additional important criteria.

Buildings worthy of protection

The challenge lies in protecting our architectural heritage while simultaneously keeping pace with technological advances. Especially when dealing with existing buildings, preservation often conflicts with adapting to modern demands.

For cultural and natural monuments, specific assessments are carried out to ensure that solar systems do not significantly impact the monument . Thanks to the tremendous advances in solar technology in recent years, solar systems can also be easily integrated into the design of listed buildings.

Smart Shower – Showers for the climate

The "Smart Shower" program finances energy-saving showers using CO2 Funding. Join now and save immediately!

As part of the "Smart Shower" campaign, Zermatt, the city of energy, once again wants to inform the population that a simple, low-cost shower head can lower energy costs, reduce CO2 emissions, and save water. This is thanks to the simple and cost-effective shower head. Around 100 households participated in the last campaign in 2020. These households saved a total of approximately 70,000 kWh of energy and emitted 13 tons less CO2

Save energy, reduce CO2

In view of the impending energy shortage, there are various measures to reduce energy consumption

On average, the second-largest energy consumption in the household is for hot water preparation . By using water-saving shower heads, water consumption can be reduced by up to 50% without sacrificing comfort, saving approximately 700 kWh of energy annually. Furthermore, the lower energy and water consumption leaves between 50 and 300 francs more in the household budget— a desirable side effect, especially given the higher



Scratching windows – clear vision is important

Many of you are probably already familiar with this: As soon as the nights get colder and you don't have a garage, the next day is spent scraping your windows. Unfortunately, it happens again and again that some road users don't take the time to do this and drive with frozen windows.



However, clearing snow and ice from cars is mandatory and absolutely necessary to ensure road safety. So-called "tank drivers" face the threat of driver's license suspension and fines, and in extreme cases, even imprisonment

Legal basis

The basis for possible fines and penalties is found in the Road Traffic Act (SVG). A safe vehicle requires, among other things, clearly legible license plates, functioning lights, and reflectors. Windows and rearview mirrors must be kept clean (Traffic Regulations: Article 57, Paragraph 2).

In addition, windows necessary for the driver's vision must allow a clear and distortion-free view, be weatherproof and allow at least 70 percent of light to pass through, even after prolonged use

No objects may be mounted in front of or behind these windows that impair the driver's vision or reduce the light transmission to less than 70 percent (Technical Road Vehicle Regulations: Article 71, paragraph 4).

According to the case law of the Federal Supreme Court and cantonal courts, driving with icy windows constitutes a moderate traffic violation under Article 16b of the Swiss Traffic Act (SVG) and results in a driver's license suspension of at least one month: further criminal and administrative proceedings are not

In more serious cases, a driver's license suspension of at least three months may be imposed. In addition, the insurance company may reduce benefits and reclaim paid compensation in the event of an accident

The Touring Club Suisse (TCS) recommends the following to defrost the windows: 1. Do not use hot water, the temperature shock



A LOOK BEHIND THE SCENES

Waste management

Since October 1, 2022, waste management has been handled by the municipality of Zermatt. What are the responsibilities of the employees at Zermatt Waste Management,

and what are their daily challenges? We take a look behind the scenes.

Every morning at 7:30 a.m., the twelve Zermatt Entsorgung employees start collecting household waste and various recyclables at the waste and recyclables collection point in Spiss , while also preparing for further transport. At the same time, the waste and recyclables collection point in Spiss, as well as the mobile collection point, are operated and various customer inquiries are processed. Starting in the winter season, waste collection and transport will be carried out

Emptying of public collection points and company containers

entirely by electric vehicles.

The collection of the various containers at the public

Collection points and the operating containers of commercial and service businesses follow a clear collection plan (see waste calendar). Due to logistical considerations and legal requirements, it is not possible to collect all waste fractions every day and prepare them for further transport.

The various presses at the public collection points and

Some commercial businesses have automatic fill level sensors. This alerts waste management management when the bin is 75% or 100% full. This ensures efficient exchange with minimal vehicle traffic.

Further transport to the customers

After collecting the household waste and the various

Recyclable materials are stored in large containers/pressurizers for rail transport from Zermatt to Visp. All containers/

Presses are then transported from Visp to individual customers in the valley by electric truck , before the empty ones are transported back to Zermatt by rail

It's repeatedly observed that many citizens act according to the motto: out of sight, out of mind. And this is precisely what repeatedly presents Zermatt Entsorgung employees with significant additional expenses. Despite clear labels on the bins and containers stating "THE RIGHT BIN," waste is repeatedly disposed of incorrectly, which then requires laborious sorting.

In addition, public waste collection centres are increasingly

Illegal disposals are again taking place, which are collected on a separate tour and the costs then have to be borne by the public.

However, one of the biggest challenges is the monthly fluctuations in household waste and recyclables, especially during peak season, when waste equivalent to more than 35,000 population equivalents is generated.

Zermatt Waste Disposal Team

The residents of Zermatt have access to an experienced team of twelve people in waste management . In addition to Mario Schnidrig, who serves as Managing Director of Recycling Processing, José Luciano De Paiva Lourenco works as Operations Manager at Zermatt Entsorgung.

Musicians gathered in the Matterhorn village and founded the first village band. Viktor Furrer, Alois Kronig, Andreas Julen, Johann Biner, Josef Taugwalder, and Johann Taugwalder provided musical accompaniment to secular and religious festivals. At the request of the hoteliers, who were already far-sighted at the time and felt a kind of "spa music" was necessary, the first Zermatt village band was formed.

In 1889, a new foundation was established, the first statutes were written, and the Cantonal Music Festival in St. Maurice was attended. Everything was viewed more from a "leisurely" perspective, and new foundations were formed in 1905 and 1909. Zermatt was on the verge of becoming a health resort, and many had other things to do besides making music.

ren. The club also faced financial difficulties. Since 1909, however, the "Matterhorn" has continuously performed on Corpus Christi , participated in music festivals and parades , performed concerts, and serenaded people or congratulated them on their birthdays with a musical bouquet of flowers. In 1998, the club celebrated its 125th birthday and received a new uniform.

Even if club life today is not

While it no longer has the same significance as it did back then, the musicians continue to play their way into the hearts of their listeners. "D'Müsig" not only represents Zermatt as a destination, it also promotes the sense of togetherness within our village community. It is an integral part of our village.

She belongs to us and we belong to her.

The fifth uniform

Until the 1950s, there was no uniform; the musicians slipped into their "Sunday clothes" and played in better trousers, a white shirt, a "Joppen," and finer shoes. In 1951, thanks to the generosity of the population, the blue uniform was acquired, and the "Matterhorn" became one of the first clubs in Valais to wear a uniform. In 1964, the "Matterhorn" was allowed to wear the second uniform.

The jacket was cardinal red, black trousers, a white belt, a peaked cap, and a plumed hat gave the new outfit a very special effect. In 1981, the third uniform was acquired. It was black, decorated with red and white trim, and had an elegant appearance. The musicians wore white shoes for gala performances. This footwear caused astonishment at some performances and increased the Matterhorn's popularity. Since 1998, the musicians have played in their current, more casual uniform. Midnight blue trousers, a red jacket, several decorations, and the legendary Bogart hat make the uniform the trademark of the Müsig.

New tourist tax regulations – Digital reporting as a solution

With the adjustment of the tourist tax regulations in the Zermatt - Matterhorn destination.

several changes have

come into effect for accommodation providers as of November 1, 2022. For example, the tourist tax

> amount has been changed. Adults now pay CHF 4 per person per overnight stay. Children

aged 9 to 15.99 pay half the rate.

Children under 9 years of age remain exempt from the tourist tax. For second

home owners and permanent tenants subject to the tourist tax, the annual flat rate is now CHF 160 per bed per year.

Also new in the tourist tax regulations is the expanded collection of personal guest data. For the purposes of calculating tourist tax and random sampling, non-personalized statistical evaluations, and providing data to the police in emergencies, each guest must be registered with the following minimum requirements: rental property (hotel or apartment), first and last name, nationality, language, date of birth, and arrival and departure dates. In addition, the primary guest must provide the following information: title, telephone number, postal address, and email address.

Also new is that tourist tax registration must be completed via the digital registration system and the digital tourist tax settlement ("zTerminal"), generally on the day of the guest's arrival. If the accommodation provider does not settle the tax via the digital registration system, this must be requested in writing from the tourist tax collection agency. Each request must include a plausible justification and will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. In any case, the payment must be made no later than one week after the guest's departure.

In the zTerminal, all requirements were already met by November 1, 2022. implemented. With the zTerminal, Zermatt Tourism thus has an efficient, digital solution available to all service partners.

To enable easy operation, there is now an Excel import function. This allows registration forms to be conveniently loaded into the zTerminal via an Excel spreadsheet. This function is also suitable for hotels that are not connected to the zTerminal via a PMS interface . This function can also be used by holiday apartment landlords


In addition, the pre-check-in for guests is regarding the refresh The Zermatt – Matterhorn brand has been updated. It now looks more modern and has been made more attractive for mobile use.

The new tourist tax regulations have also been implemented for pre-check-in and the guest data fields have been adjusted. In this context, the extract of completed pre-check-ins, which is sent daily to participating accommodation providers, has also been updated and made more user-friendly.

In order to comply with the new tourist tax regulations, accommodation providers are recommended to switch to the zTerminal immediately.



Sustainably sustainable

Dear insiders

Global warming, CO2 footprint, greenhouse effect, climate crisis... Every day we read and hear about the causes and effects of our actions on our planet. Extreme weather, hunger, and refugee flows will soon be the consequences of the changes we are causing through excessive and harmful consumption - according to a relevant NGO (non-governmental organization) website. Tourism is at the forefront of the dock. And if we look out the window, all these predictions seem to be coming true: After a winter with little snow and a dry summer, we now also had the warmest autumn since systematic measurements began. The summer ski resort, which has been in operation continuously since the 1960s, had to take a break for the first time , and the planned World Cup races have literally fallen through. Two events that fit well into the landscape, which is visibly changing due to the melting glaciers around Zermatt.

It should be clear to everyone that we must act. But sustainably, please.

Sustainable means preserving the way of life we have created for ourselves here in this remote valley into the future. For us to behave in an ecologically responsible manner, economic sustainability is essential. This basic prerequisite, it seems to me, has been somewhat lost recently. The demands are becoming more radical, unrealistic, even hostile to the (tourism) economy by the day. We are beginning to limit our competitiveness and fail to recognize that in doing so, we are jeopardizing our livelihood. I therefore advocate a measured approach without radical demands, as recently outlined in a fact sheet from the University of Bern and the Wyss Academy for Nature. Because let's be honest: If we restrict ourselves so drastically that we suddenly become economic refugees ourselves, environmental protection will no longer play a role in our actions.



Matterhorn Alpine Crossing

Winter is coming to the two construction sites of the Matterhorn Glacier Ride II. The work in the outdoor areas is demanding

The cold temperatures require even more concentration and skill. Some workers are

happy to be able to carry out their duties inside the stations . Various preparatory work is being carried out for the cable pull, which is scheduled for the end of January 2023. For example, the material cable car must be moved to ensure sufficient space for the installation of the cables.

The work will take around three and a half months for the cable pull of the five cables in total. In the period from February 2023 to June 2023 Various interior work will be carried out and between May 2023 and June 2023 The railway will be thoroughly tested so that it can be put into operation in early summer can take place in 2023.

Further down the valley, construction work is underway fo the new cable car from Zermatt to Furi and for the new building of the valley station on

Full speed ahead. Looking up toward Furi, you can see supports two and three, which have already been installed. Excavation and securing work at the stations

was completed on March 30. Construction will begin in November 2022, and concret work will begin in spring 2023. For the 2022/2023 winter season, the queueing area around the Matterhorn Express valley station will be optimized for guest flow and significantly enlarged to relieve congestion on Schluhmattstrasse.

Slope optimization

In addition to the larger construction projects, various slopes were renovated during the summer. , thereby increasing guest safety. Among other things, improvements were made to the "Howette" piste (number 3) by removing the Gryfelblatte rock, and the renovation of the Obere National snowmaking system was completed . Renaturation measures were undertaken in the Stafelalp region to meet ecological and environmental protection requirements. Work was also carried out in the Rothorn area. For example, the foundations of the old Kumberg triple chairlift were rebuilt.



History of Zermatt

Karl Lehner – Zermatt postal legend, 52 years in the postal service

Karl Lehner was born on

August 13, 1894, the eldest child of Theophil and

Cäcilia Lehner-Biner in Zermatt. His father,

Theophil, had moved to Zermatt from the Lötschental valley with two other brothers.

He worked as a teacher and postmaster in the Matterhorn village. He also ran a prosperous farm, where Karl actively helped as a boy.

After primary school, the young Karl first attended the college in Sarnen and then the Canons' College in St. Maurice. With this good education, he acquired an excellent general knowledge. In 1919, he took over from his father.

the post office. Karl had been working as an assistant postman in the postal service since 1907. In 1925, He advised Olga Strebel, the head secretary of the Seiler Hotels. The couple had three children. In 1948, the post office was elevated to a post office, and Karl the first

Zermatt postal administrator. As such, after 52 years of postal service, he retired

served as a boarding house.

But even in retirement, Karl remained extremely active. Now he had more time for his historical research and writing. He died on October 19, 1978, at the ripe old age of 84.


Karl Lehner – a factotum

Karl Lehner was a man of exceptionally diverse interests and dedication throughout his life. He made his talents available to the public for decades.

There was hardly a club in the village of which he didn't belong, serve on the board, or serve as president. So it's not surprising that no fewer than 14 clubs made him an honorary member.

For many years he was president of the Kurverone, head of the village health insurance fund and the consumer cooperative, commander of the local fire department, and cantonal fire department instructor. In 1944, he was the first non-Burger to be elected to the Zermatt municipal council.

Sports clubs could also count on him. As an active skier, he worked in

Ski club committee as actuary and chronicler.

He also served as an international ski jump judge

and was a member of the ice hockey and curling clubs. For many years, he was a member of the local SAC chapter, where he served as president and secretary. He was also actively involved in church service, serving as an usher at the Corpus Christi procession and funerals.

Even though his achievements and public activities may be somewhat forgotten by the younger generation, his cultural and local historical work will endure for generations to come.

Karl Lehner excelled as a director of numerous plays. The older Zer-


