The last school year was all about energy.

Before school started, the teachers visited the Hydro Exploitation facility in Zmutt, and right at the beginning of the school year, the children and teachers experienced a "powerless day." The topic of "energy" was present in the classroom throughout the year and addressed through various activities. The crowning conclusion for the entire school was "Energy Day" in May. We learned a lot about the careful use of our resources, about our own energy balance, and about sustainability. Zermatt is an energy city, and now the Zermatt schools are also striving for the "Energy School" label – here are the key goals:

A major financial investment in our school and a great opportunity for the children and teachers.

While school operations begin in the new premises, the third building will be demolished in spring 2024. Kindergartens and childcare will be located there starting in 2025. Having education and childcare under one roof means shorter distances and smarter use of resources. Since education and childcare will also become more closely integrated organizationally, we have commissioned Katja Hächler to lead the project planning.

"Teamwork makes the dream work." I thank the school administration and the school committee for the enriching collaboration over the past year and look forward to the new challenges.

The school year is upon us with the motto: "Our path: real - digital." I am sure it will be a great school year.
















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

"Our path: real – digital"

At the start of the school year, the students of the orientation school and their teachers will be provided with a new teaching aid: their own tablet.

Unser Weg: real digital

Wir wünschen dir ein erfolgreiches Schuljahr!

As soon as the "Niww Walka" school building is ready for occupancy, the students in grades 7H and 8H will be provided with a personal device. Tablets are available to the younger students in the classroom, which they may occasionally take home for specific tasks . The digitalization of learning environments opens up new opportunities for teachers and students to navigate an increasingly digitalized school and work world. Furthermore, the module curriculum and the "Media, Informatics and Applications" (MIA) curriculum guide regulate the point in time at which the relevant application skills are acquired in class. The presence of the new "learning companion" will impact everyday school and family life. Therefore, the school administration has chosen the guiding theme for the 2023/24 school year: "Our path: real -

The situation surrounding Covid-19 has worsened during the lockdown. downs highlighted the limitations regarding the availability of devices, networks and platforms as well as equal opportunities

Furthermore, the canton sets out in its mission statement Re requirements regarding digitalization in schools (Office 365, MIA OS/PS, data protection, curriculum, IT charter, number of devices in the classroom). The school administration revised the schools' IT concept in 2022/23 in collaboration with the municipality of Zermatt and is now permitted to begin implementation this school year

How useful is the use of digital media?

"Education uses technology." This short sentence contains a dynamic: Since the beginning of teaching, teachers have used tools such as blackboards, overhead projectors, calendar images, educational posters. 16mm film, slides, television, tape recording. etc., to convey learning content. The use of educational technologies can profoundly change learning and now offers new ways to convey learning content. While it seems obvious that children should work and learn digitally from as early as possible, there are also concerns. "Shouldn't children play together, gain experience in nature, do crafts and work with their hands, and perceive their environment with all their senses instead of pressing buttons on a keyboard?" The misunderstanding lies in the word "instead of."

Digital media never replaces the valuable activities mentioned above, but they enhance them. This combination must be used wisely at home and in the classroom. Teachers are mediapedagogically trained.

They are well-trained and aware of the topic. They have the power to find the right balance. That's why the school administration has chosen the guiding theme: "Our path: real - digital."

The following example illustrates this: The pupils discover ants in the forest and observe

They observe their behavior. They photograph or film the animals to later show or present them to others. They find information about these busy little creatures in an online educational video or instructions for crafts. Digital media, as a tool, creates possibilities that aren't possible in traditional classrooms.

The tablet school?

The coexistence of «analog» and «digital»

Teaching is central. The lesson doesn't begin with, "Please get your charged laptops out of your school bag." Whether and when the devices are needed depends on the subject matter. It might be that a nonfiction text is read in a traditional way from a book questions about it are discussed with the class in a circle, and the answers are written down on a worksheet . Afterwards, capitalization and grammar are practiced in a short sequence using the "Anton app." The teacher could also distribute

An app, however, has the advantage of providing direct feedback to the student as to whether their answer is correct or incorrect. Children and young people can practice individually according to their strengths. This demonstrates the added value of the digital tool. A simple "right" or "wrong" is of little use. It is much more important that the teacher gives the student feedback that promotes learning (e.g., by explaining a rule again). This enables real progress. Digitalization should not be an end in itself. Therefore, the teacher asks themselves when the use of a digital tool is beneficial to the student and when it is not. As a foundation, for example, young people first learn how to accurately construct angles on paper using a pencil and set square. They can then solve corresponding problems using the geometry software "GeoGebra."

The "Media and Informatics" module curriculum of the Curriculum 21 (Lehrplan 21) aims to ensure that students acquire application skills. They acquire the basic knowledge of hardware and software, as well as digital networks, necessary for the competent use of


They acquire skills in the use of information and communication technologies for effective learning and action in various professional and life areas.

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areas, both in terms of school and everyday life and later professional work. The application skills are acquired across subjects where they are needed . Often, they cannot be taught alongside other subjects. The competency area has three parts, from which the following example can be used to explain the lesson

1. Handling (Example 6H): «Write

texts with the keyboard»: From 6H onwards, the

The "Typewriter" learning program is available for keyboard typing . The keyboard typing implementation guide shows the objectives, content distribution, lesson organization, and assessment.

2. Research and learning support (Example 7H)

"Searching with Keywords, Operators, and Filters": The "Connected" teaching material includes a comprehensive chapter on web search. It focuses on the function of a search engine and assessing information

3. Production and presentation (example 9OS)

"Share a presentation and edit it collaboratively, as well as use permissions specifically (e.g., commenting function)": With digital tools like Office 365, Prezi, or Padlet, presentations can be planned, created, and edited together, regardless of time and location. This allows students to work on collaborative projects even from home.

Clothing collection – with a difference

During and especially

at the end of the school year, abandoned clothing, lunch boxes, drinking bottles, hats,

umbrellas, slippers, stuffed
animals, sneakers and gym
bags pile up in the
cloakrooms, teachers'
rooms and school
entrances.

Locked children's bikes and kickboards have been sitting in the bike rack for weeks. Earrings are waiting in the lost and found office in the school office. Watches, keys, cell phones, or AirPods are waiting for their owners. We live in a society of excess, and it's rare for schoolchildren, teenagers, or parents to ask where their gym shorts or jacket are: "Appa lost," and "abracadabra!" a new bike helmet is bought.

Lost and Found

The found clothes and items come in all sizes and belong to everyone from kindergarten students to junior high school students. Teachers or the caretaker team store them in a clothing box at the school entrance or at the entrance to the temporary building, where they can be picked up. More valuable items like cell phones, necklaces, or electronic devices are kept in the office. Occasionally, concerned children drop by, or attentive parents call to ask if, for example, their lost braces have been found. Other children know their missing jacket or sweater very well (color, logo, etc.) and know where they lost or forgot it. Unfortunately, this is an exception; at the end of the school year, boxes of lost and found items remain.



"Out of sight, out of mind..." – many items of clothing ended up in the used clothing collection or were thrown away – what a pity, really.

What to do?

The stock excha

The student council had a good idea: They organized a kind of "fair" after school . In a classroom, all the clothes they had found, from a pair of purple socks to fashionable sneakers, were neatly lined up and presented, some even washed and folded . The students, along with their parents, were able to

Searching for lost items, many a gym bag found its owner again. This fair is scheduled to be repeated in the 2023/24 school year. It's worth stopping by!

Cover letter

The method may be ancient, but it's effective. Parents simply label clothing, bicycle helmets, and ice skates with their children's names at the beginning of the school year. This makes it easy to find their owner. This trick also helps at school camps.

Take care

A saying goes that we should take care of the things entrusted to us. Children can't just do that. They have to learn to look for lost things, keep an eye on their school supplies and sneakers, and consider whether they have everything with them. This is a matter of upbringing and can be learned with the help of parents and teachers. Constantly following up is tiring, but helpful. So it's necessary to check the gym, the school entrance, the teacher, the office, or the school purse several times to see if...? It's inconvenient, but it promotes orderliness.

To ensure the operation and availability of public facilities, professional maintenance and upkeep of the facilities provided is required.

The SSFA team is responsible for this support service in the municipality of Zermatt.

These include: carrying out various repair work and checking the condition of school, sports and leisure facilities, cleaning municipal offices, school buildings and other municipal properties, acting as an interface and providing support for functions and events, co-designing new facilities and optimising existing facilities, providing summer and winter activities, snow removal, meeting the needs of schools, tourism and clubs, maintaining vehicles and work equipment, waste management in public spaces, repairing damage caused by vandalism and analyzing damage reports.

This is just a part of the diverse activities in the SSFA department.

The tasks are highly varied, and a dynamic workplace is guaranteed. Flexibility and situational decision-making, including those based on weather conditions, are part of everyday business.

School facilities and municipal properties

The municipality of Zermatt has a total of five school buildings, where classes are held from kindergarten through primary school. The SSFA is responsible for the operation, maintenance, and cleaning of the school buildings and various municipal properties. A total of four cleaning specialists and a school caretaker ensure a clean infrastructure. The new "Niww Walka" school building represents a major and exciting challenge for the entire team, and they are delighted to oversee and maintain this multi-generational project .

A total of six employees work at the sports and leisure facilities. They support the staff at the other branches as needed. Together, they maintain the following facilities:

Obere Matten (meeting place, approx. 4500 m2): in winter the natural ice rink for ice skating and curling, in spring for Zermatt Unplugged, in summer/autumn for events and various sports such as beach volleyball or basketball

Sportarena Obere Matten (approx. 2000 m2): in winter artificial ice rink for ice hockey, ice skating and curling, events and school sports, in spring for Zermatt Unplugged, in summer/autumn for tennis

Chrome Sports Field: during spring, summer and autumn for football, School sports, pump track, outdoor gym and barbecue areas

Leisure facilities

The SSFA is responsible for the maintenance of four playgrounds in the village. In addition to safety-related aspects, she ensures worry-free operation and is responsible for the technical maintenance and cleanliness of the playgrounds.

Revision of the Regulations on the first and

Second home construction

The adoption of the Second Home Initiative on 11 March 2012 has fundamentally changed the situation regarding the construction and use of second homes.

Article 75b of the Federal Constitution and its implementing legislation have become a challenge, especially for those municipalities that already had their own spatial planning instruments to regulate the construction of second homes.

It is now clear to what extent the Second Home Act (ZWG) and the Second Home Ordinance (ZWV) are unable to meet the needs of the municipality of Zermatt. After approximately ten years, the effects of the abolition of these municipal regulations can be identified (including a shift in demand for second homes to older buildings, increased misuse of commercially rented primary residences, etc.). Furthermore, legal loopholes have emerged that must now be closed at the municipal level to proactively counteract undesirable developments.

Objectives of the audit

The new version of the primary and secondary residence regulations is intended to close gaps, preserve the strengths of the existing regulations wherever possible, take regional characteristics into account, and optimally utilize the remaining competencies for sustainable settlement development. The draft also contains provisions that are intended to take into account the idea of preserving and creating housing for local residents.

After the regulations were submitted to the relevant stakeholders in a consultation round in November 2020 and subsequently to the canton for an initial preliminary review, the draft is now to be presented to the public.



Contamination by operating materials, oils and Chemicals



Currently, the Zermatt Fire Department is increasingly responding to oil/chemical spills in the Zermatt area. These incidents generally involve contamination of traffic areas and soil with liquid

safe operating materials





The interventions are very complex and lengthy . In most cases, appropriate action could prevent incidents or minimize the extent of

Environmental threats and hazards

Leaking substances that could endanger the environment must be collected, contained, and disposed of as quickly as possible . In any case, once the contamination has been identified, further spread must be prevented by all means. Both soil and water bodies can be affected. In the worst case.

Contamination of drinking water can be expected. To understand: 1 liter of diesel can save up to 1 million liters Make water undrinkable! Depending on the type of substance, this can also pose a very high fire hazard and cause odor emissions. Furthermore, contaminated road surfaces are slippery and can quickly lead to accidents involving vehicles, cyclists, or pedestrians.

Intervention and coping

This year, 19 oil spill incidents have occurred in Zermatt, requiring the fire service to intervene. A total of 2 tons of binding agent and over 160 man-hours were deployed. the time spent on dealing with it.

At this point, we would like to thank the members of the fire service and their employers for their willingness and generosity

Depending on the situation, collecting, containing and absorbing the substance can be very complex and time-consuming. When work is carried out on public roads, traffic routes must be closed for the safety of emergency personnel. In any case, every effort is made to keep disruptions as short as possible

In addition to the fire department, the technical service of the municipality of Zermatt is often deployed with special vehicles to assist in the collection of the binding agent and then hand it over for proper

In the case of soil contamination, it must be laboriously removed and transported to a special treatment facility in Susten. In the case of contamination of flowing waters, the effort is even greater, as the substance spreads very quickly and over a large area . In such a case, fire departments in the Matter Valley and the Lonza C-Weir will also be

Accidents cannot be completely ruled out. However, many events could be avoided or significantly reduced through responsible action

Vehicles should be regularly inspected for leaks of operating fluids, and loads of hazardous materials must be properly and correctly prepared and secured . During the journey, attention should be paid to any defects or losses of operating materials.

In case of detection of loss of substances, the Immediate stop of the vehicle, call the fire brigade by Call emergency number 118 and collect the leaking substances. Catch and prevent further leakage. Furthermore, other road users should be prevented from driving or walking through the substance, thus causing it to spread . If possible, clear signage should be provided using a breakdown triangle or warning posts. This procedure should also be applied when third parties observe the situation.

During ongoing interventions, the instructions and requests of the emergency services must always be followed.



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The Riffelalp Alpine Cooperative was founded in 2017 by the Zermatt Civic Community and locally based private individuals with the idea of sustainably restoring the Riffelalp, a former Zermatt cow pasture, in addition to the existing Stafelalp, and reviving the tradition and culture of Zermatt.

In the initial phase, 20 "galte" cows were purchased and herded on the Riffelalp and Riffelboden alpine pastures for 90 days each summer. The animals were financed by interested private individuals. The number of cows that can be herded each year is limited, so demand quickly far exceeded supply.

Two years ago, dairy cows were added to the alpine pastures in addition to the "Galttiere" (sheep). These were brought to Zermatt by local farmers and farmers from Switzerland to the Riffelalp for their summer vacation. The basic idea was to bring dairy cattle back to the Riffelalp meadows to produce local dairy products. Since then, the milk has been processed in the village by the Horu cheese

To raise awareness of the initiative and highlight the efforts being made to continue traditional dairy farming, the world's first cow hotel is scheduled to open on Riffelalp starting in the 2024 summer its four-legged guests with lush green meadows, unique service, and views of the Matterhorn. Starting next winter, patrons will have the opportunity to sponsor a cow's stay on Riffelalp by booking overnight stays or packages for her on the Bellevache Resort website. In return, donors will receive, among other things, a cowbell or a room upgrade at the Grand Hotel Zermatterhof, a cheese platter, or a diploma with a photo of their favorite cow, as well as other unique benefits provided by participating partners.

One day, there will be 35 cows on the mountain pasture, happy hotel guests. Shepherd and hotel director Roli and his team care for the animals with dedication and provide them with five-star service.

The day begins with a nutritious breakfast buffet for the four-legged friends. Afterwards, the animals are lovingly cared for, milked, brushed, and perhaps even given a haircut or a massage. At the Bellevache Resort, special attention is paid to their diet, and throughout the day, hotel guests are taken to the most beautiful spots with the lushest flowers.

Digital information gathering has many positive aspects - for example, the 24/7 availability of information and the diversity of this information. The downside?

More and more professions where personal contact with customers is paramount are seeing their existence threatened by digital alternatives. But do virtual consulting assistants and robots really replace the experience and quality of personal consulting?

Twelve hours a day personally on-site for the guests and thus promotes a personal, individual and highde Guest communication and guest advice. The quality of stay on site is essential for a successful tourism destination.

Ultimately, it's the smiles and the stories that unfold on-site that are shared at home that determine whether a customer recommends the business or not. That's why we're extending opening hours and recruiting new staff accordingly.

Nevertheless, the tourism industry is also examining the potential of artificial intelligence for its usefulness. From anonymous data to information

Bonfire has its own forecast and
Analysis tool developed that identifies and
answers many questions from service partners.

What is the current capacity occupancy in the Zermatt – Matterhorn destination? How many guests are expected in the Is peak season expected? How many overnight stays were generated this year? How many days do guests stay on average in the summer? How high is the occupancy rate of my property compared to the destination or other accommodations? These are questions that concern the destination's service partners . To answer these questions, Bonfire has developed a forecasting and analysis tool.

The forecast and analysis tool offers users three different analysis charts. One allows them to view the occupancy of the destination or their own business. The other allows them to analyze the number of overnight stays and the length of stay of guests. Users can choose between actual figures, relative changes, or cumulative displays.

You can choose the period you want to use for the comparison . For example, you can select a month, a year, or a custom period with any start and end date in the past or future . This can then be viewed using a different period, using the same selection options .

Accommodation providers can also compare their own establishments with those of other accommodation providers in the destination. This allows them to choose from hotels of various star categories, apartments, and mountain huts. Data protection is, of course, maintained, so that no conclusions can be drawn about individual establishments.

When evaluating data, the quality of the data is crucial. The evaluated graphics can only be as good as the data used to create them. Furthermore, the reliability increases the more service partners participate in the zTerminal (a tool for digital registration and tourist tax billing). Any accommodation providers interested in the tool and the zTerminal are welcome to contact Zermatt Tourism's e-marketing department (e-marketing@zermatt.swiss).



Zermatt cable cars

The world's first AURO aerial tramway will start operations in autumn 2023

Construction work on the new cable car from

Zermatt to Furi is progressing.

The AURO cable car will begin operations in autumn 2023, and the valley station, including the ticket offices, will be back in its usual location at the start of the 2023/24 winter season.

A high level of technology and safety

The abbreviation AURO stands for «Autonomous Ropeway Operation» and the AURO-pendulum railway are characterized by their operator-free It is technically at the cutting edge, impressing with intelligent and networked technology and the highest level of safety. It is equipped with cameras and sensors that monitor the system – especially when entering and exiting the gondolas . The system independently detects situations that deviate from "normal operation." Employees can operate the ropeway from a control center, the so-called "Ropeway Operation Center (ROC)." The perfect synergy of people and advanced technology results in high reliability. The Kumme gondola in Zermatt, the first AURO gondola in the

Switzerland put into operation.



Reinhard Lauber, Head of Technology South at
Zermatt Bergbahnen, says: "In AURO operation, many
monitoring tasks are performed by the technology. A
ride can be released and monitored fully automatically,
without the need for employees, as is the case with
aerial tramways without AURO operation. The
technology also ensures a 24-hour on-call service.

Limited space as a challenge

The valley station and the mountain station of the new Aerial trams will be barrier-free and level The train was built directly adjacent to the existing Matterhorn Express stations . For this reason , a solution had to be found for the limited space, especially at the valley station. Together with Garaventa AG, it was decided to construct a so-called sliding platform. As soon as a cable car leaves the valley station, the platform moves to the other side to allow the oncoming cable car to enter.

The axle distance between the two cabins at the valley station is therefore only 3.7 meters, while the conventional track width of the aerial tramway is 15 meters.

Since the distance between the valley station and Since the first support is too narrow to expand from 3.7 meters to the conventional track width of 15 meters, a standard support could not be built for technical reasons, so a circular support with a suspension cable saddle in the center was chosen. This creates a sufficiently large span between the first and second supports to expand to the track width of 15 meters.














Since July 1, 2023, the highest Alpine crossing by cable car has been possible, bringing the two destinations of Zermatt and Cervinia even closer together. The opening ceremony of the Matterhorn Alpine Crossing took place on June 30, 2023, with numerous invited guests at the Testa Grigia station and was moderated by Michelle Hunziker. The following day, the new cable car was open to the public as part of the "Open Cable Car Day."

The opening ceremony on June 30, 2023, was a complete success, and the realization of the long-awaited dream of generations was duly celebrated.

Around 350 guests gathered at the Testa Grigia station to witness the historic moment. For around one and a guarter hours, various constellations in the form of

Panel discussions focused on the significance of the new connection and the new opportunities it creates. Shortly after 2:30 p.m., the moment finally arrived – the symbolic red ribbon was cut and the first ride with the new cabins became a reality. Afterwards, the

new station can be visited and a rich aperitif can be enjoyed.

An emotional moment

Anton Lauber has been head of the construction department since the merger of Zermatt Bergbahnen in 2002 and has implemented various projects.

At the end of the year he will retire.

At the end of his tenure at Zermatt Bergbahnen, he received a surprise that stirred great emotion. The Board of Directors, led by President Franz Julen, together with CEO Markus Hasler, decided to honor him as a railway patron, thus immortalizing him in the history of Zermatt Bergbahnen.

Sunshine on the Open Railway Day

On the day of the official opening, the weather was at its best. Numerous guests from

Switzerland and Italy took advantage of the opportunity to take a ride on the new cable car over the Theodul Glacier . Hardly a camera or cell phone went unused during the approximately four-minute ride between the Klein Matterhorn and Testa Grigia – the view of the Matterhorn was perfect and captured on film. As during the opening ceremony the day before, Laura Zimmermann and Lyam Cruz created a lively atmosphere in the valley station with their music.

New Annual Pass Xtended 365

The expansion of the service with the new year-round connection between Switzerland and Italy also creates a new additional ticketing offer. The annual pass can now be extended for an additional charge of CHF 400, including unlimited access to Cervinia in summer. The so-called Xtended 365 annual pass offers the opportunity to travel from Zermatt to Cervinia and back throughout the year . The CHF 400 additional charge to the current annual pass applies to both residents and guests. The current annual pass, with unlimited access to Italy in winter and all Zermatt cable cars in summer, will remain available.

Folklore Festival in Zermatt Tradition that brings locals and guests together

For the 53rd time, the annual folklore festival will transform our village on the second weekend in August into a vibrant hustle and bustle full of color, traditional music, joyful laughter, and conviviality The grand parade on Saturday afternoon is the highlight of the event, with a total of 30 groups taking center stage. They will yodel, dance, play the alphorn, drum, and wave flags to their heart's content, delighting locals and visitors alike and bringing them together.

What began on a small scale in 1969 has developed over the years into a permanent fixture among the destination's top 10 events. Why exactly does this event enjoy such great popularity? It's partly the mix of diverse performances and visitors, and partly the harmonious overall package of a folklore festival in front of Switzerland's most iconic mountain.


The folklore festival in Zermatt can be described as colorful in many ways.

The first thing that comes to mind are the colorful costumes of the musical groups that travel from all over Switzerland. But the diverse music in the form of flutes, drum rolls, alphorns, yodeling, the colorful flags of the various clubs, and the Swiss food offer a variety of options for every taste. Perhaps the most beautiful, colorful mix, however, is what Zermatt is generally known for: a village of locals that opens its doors to the world, offering insights into the Swiss mountains and traditions. The Folklore Festival is one of the few occasions where locals and guests sit together at the same table and toast to life.

Bianca Ballmann, head of the Mattertal Youth Services Office and also a member of the Folklore Festival's organizing committee, writes similarly in the foreword to the festival guide. For her, the Folklore Festival has always been an occasion where locals and visitors meet and spend a good time together. She marveled at the parade as a child , later became a part of it herself, and now has the honor of leading the Folklore Festival as the organizing committee president. She thanks everyone involved in the festival, as the proceeds go to a good cause.

All proceeds from the folklore festival go to the Mattertal Youth Fund. The fund supports children and young adults in the school districts of Zermatt, Täsch, and Randa. The money goes to clubs, groups, projects, and

Outdoor barbecue

When temperatures rise again, the general public enjoys a barbecue outdoors.

However, cantonal and regional regulations must be observed.



According to cantonal law, open fires are strictly prohibited throughout the canton of Valais. This applies to both traditional barbecues and the burning

or construction waste. Nevertheless, barbecues in Zermatt are permitted. provided the regulations are observed.

Legal framework

Cantonal legislation stipulates in the "Forest and Natural Hazards Act (kGWNg)" that fires in or near forests are prohibited throughout the canton. Except for fire pits officially designated as such by the municipalities

Furthermore, according to the cantonal "Environmental Protection Act (kUSG)", there is a general ban on burning any type of waste (including green waste and construction waste) outdoors

Violations of the relevant instructions will be punished, and any interventions by emergency personnel will be charged to the perpetrator. It is also important that the instructions of the authorities and emergency personnel must be followed in all cases.

General fire ban due to dry periods

As a result of prolonged dry periods, the canton may impose more extensive restrictions (general fire bans, including for barbecues, charcoal grills, fireworks, etc.). These are published in the official gazette and generally disseminated through the media.

Forest fire risk and air pollution

The reason for this restrictive approach is primarily the high risk of forest fires, wildfires (dry forests and meadows), and peatland fires in Valais, which leaves relatively little room for maneuver. However, with regard to the incineration of any type of waste (including green waste and construction waste), air pollution and, more broadly, soil pollution also play a significant role.

Barbecue fun in Zermatt and Täsch

However, outside of the general fire bans due to drought, there's no need to miss out on the barbecue fun. As already mentioned, there are official barbecue areas available. The municipalities of Zermatt and Täsch, as well as Zermatt Bergbahnen AG and the magazine "Schweizer Familie," now provide eight barbecue areas of this type in both municipalities , which are maintained and supplied with firewood during the summer

History of Zermatt

Hugo Lehner – On skis to the altar

Hugo Lehner is completely
different from Otto
Furrer. Bold, even daring necky and fearless He jumped around like a
chamois on brittle ridge rock.
Always ready to help,
always and everywhere he
was

was just needed.

His wedding in Zermatt was also legendary. To surprise his bride,
Bertha Biner, at the altar, he skied from the Oberdorf in elegant
curves to the church square. We often worried about him and begged
him to be more careful. Ironic twist of fate. The saying goes—

The cautious Otto Furrer fell to his death on his mountain when a rope broke; the daredevil Hugo Lehner, however, died at home a year later from a long-term illness.

ness in his bed.

Since the first Matterhorn film in 1928, Hugo was a constant companion and friend of Luis Trenker. So it was no wonder that Hugo proved himself a valuable collaborator in all of his films.

"Luis Trenker was with Hugo in Spitsbergen. Their ship , the Hobby , froze in a narrow fjord during the night and could not be freed. We had to

We were trying to blast a channel through the drifting ice to get out of the fjord and onto the open sea. To do this, we needed dynamite, but we didn't have any.

We knew that a coal mine was operating about a day and a half's march away. Explosives must be available there. The Norwegians knew the treacherous sea of ice far better than we did and therefore had no intention of venturing onto the ice. So Hugo Lehner, who always helped when help was needed, set out with a German emigrant. No sooner had Lehner left than the weather changed. In great concern,

We waited two days for his return. After three days, we went searching. Hour after hour, always following the compass, we worked our way in the direction from which Hugo must have come. And then, finally, on the fourth -

Ten days after we had already given up hope , Lehner, snow-blind and completely exhausted, came out of the fog to meet us. He could hardly open his watery eyes and no longer had the strength to -

shout. If we hadn't miraculously stumbled upon him, he would never have reached our ship. As soon as he was back on his feet, we used dynamite to blast a narrow channel through the pack ice, and, to the cheers of my crew, we were able to

by) out into the ice-floe-strewn Arctic Ocean.

Lars Nielsen, the dog handler, spotted three polar bears standing at the railing. He immediately rushed out with ammunition and Weir in the boat. Great excitement among the crew.

The bears didn't care about our ship. Nielsen had come within almost 300 paces of them. Lying on his stomach, he aimed and fired. Hit, the large ship sank.

The bear fell into the snow. The two cubs jumped into the sea. Nielsen stood up and jumped over dancing ice floes to his prey.

Then a larger ice floe gap blocked his path. He changed direction, estimated the distance to the next ice floe, bounced his legs, jumped, reached the small ice floe, stood upright for a fraction of a second, and then sank between the ice floes.


Ice sheets in the icy waters. We stood there, frozen and pale with fear. My throat was choking. I couldn't call out. A shudder came over me when I saw the two young polar bears dive after us with lightning speed...

That could have happened to Hugo too, when he was missing for three days. Did he have a good guardian angel?

Hugo Lehner (*1901)

In the 1920s and 1930s he was one of the most feared cross-country skiers and strongest patrollers on the Matterhorn - village. He was the first director of the ski school from Zarmett.

Hugo Lehner can also be called the first freerider. A track that immediately caught our attention with its extraordinary line. Over small jumps, steep slopes, between rocky gullies and mountain firs, a rider had created his rare

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Gornergrat Railway (annual series)

Gornergrat Railway -Fascinating for 125 years 125 stories at www.gornergrat.ch/125

The Gornergrat Railway has been in existence for 125 years. In all six issues of "Zermatt Inside" 2023, we will be reporting on this historic anniversary.

As a historical retrospective, 125 stories can be read on the Gornergrat Railway website. These are divided into four categories: People, Nature, Railway and Technology, and Fun Facts. Below is a sample of each story to whet your appetite.

Nature

The landscape between Zermatt and the Gornergrat is unparalleled – we reveal some of its secrets.

Story No. 16: The Gorner Glacier - an ice giant through the ages

The Gorner Glacier is surrounded by 29 four-thousand-meter peaks and has been flowing through the Gornergrat mountains for thousands of years. Just 170 years ago, it was an impressive 16 kilometers long and stretched almost to Schweigmatten. Today, it measures around 12 kilometers, and its mass is constantly decreasing. Since the summer of 2019, it has been separated from its neighbor, the Grenzgletscher.


Story No. 9: 9 kilometers uphill

The operating length of the Gornergrat Railway is 9 kilometers and 339 meters. The tunnels and galleries

They have a total length of 1,364 m, representing 14.4 percent of the railway line. They cross five bridges and short viaducts over a distance of 127 m, including the Getwing Bridge (24 m) and the Findelbach Bridge (90 m).

The entire line is equipped with Abt's cogwheel system. Around 155,000 cogs help the railway negotiate the steep route from Zermatt to the Gornergrat.

In 1957, the Alpine Club London celebrated its 100th anniversary at the Riffelalp hotel resort. The highlight was the visit of Sir Edmund Hillary in August 1957.
